

Tuesday Fire Severely Damages Baker City Home

Fiery Afternoon

When Stephenie Murdock learned that her neighbor's house was on fire Tuesday afternoon she couldn't simply run out the front door to safety.

Murdock and her husband, Steven, operate an adult foster care in their home at 2355 Baker St., just south of St. Elizabeth Towers between Fourth and Fifth streets.

The couple care for two people in their home, one of whom is immobile and the other nearly so.

Stephenie Murdock said she initially heard a loud "pop," which she thought might have come from a different neighbor who has been doing some construction work.

But a few minutes later someone pounded on her front

door. It was her neighbor, Michelle Budd, alerting her to the fire.

Murdock credits Budd, who knows the Murdocks care for

people confined to wheelchairs, with acting quickly to alert the couple.

Schools may seek \$10 million bond in **May 2020**

The Baker School Board is considering asking voters to approve a \$10 million bond to fund school improvements in a May 2020 election under a plan presented by consultants Tuesday night.

The bond would be paid off in 10 years at an estimated rate of 88 cents per \$1,000 of assessed property value.

Superintendent Mark Witty said the plan has not been finalized.

"That is where they land now," Witty said of the Board. "Until they make a resolution and vote on it, there is room for adjustment."

The District is working to devise a plan that would be more palatable to voters than the \$48 million, 30-year bond measure that would have been paid at a rate of \$1.97 per \$1,000 of assessed value that was defeated by a wide margin in the November 2018 election, Witty said.

Blaze burns near Durkee

A rare May wildfire burned about 102 acres near Durkee on Tuesday.

Fire crews from the BLM and the Burnt River Rangeland Fire Protection Association fought the blaze near Shirttail Creek about five miles southeast of Durkee and about a mile south of Interstate 84.

The fire started on private land and spread onto public land managed by the BLM, said Al Crouch, fire mitigation and education specialist for the agency's Vale District.

"It's a little surprising that we get a fire on May 14 in that area," Crouch said Tuesday afternoon.

City Council approves garbage rate increase

The Baker City Council approved an 18.75% increase in garbage collection rates Tuesday.

The new rate schedule for Baker

Sanitary Service, which boosts the monthly residential fee for weekly pickup of a standard rollcart from \$16 to \$19, takes effect July 1.

The schedule includes a new option, at \$15 per month, for customers who only need to have their rollcarts emptied once every two weeks.

Councilors approved the rate hike by a 5-2 vote, with Arvid Andersen and Randy Schiewe opposed.

Andersen said this morning that

"disappointed" with Baker Sanitary for not looking at different options for processing recyclable plastics.

he opposed the increase because he's
