50 YEARS AGO from the Democrat-Herald June 6, 1969

25 YEARS AGO from the Baker City Herald June 6, 1994

For Ray Smith of Baker City, D-Day was June 5, 1944, not June 6.

Just before midnight and the start of what would later be called "The Longest Day," Smith, then a 27-year-old paratrooper, jumped with about 20 others from a C-47 airplane over Northwestern France. His and the other Allied planes were identified by three stripes on the wings and fuselage, he remembers, eyes wandering away for a moment to find the 50-year-old memory.

ONE YEAR AGO from the Baker City Herald June 6, 2018

Some of Baker City's oldest, or at least most decrepit, sewer pipes are getting a face-lift this month.

Except the new face, so to speak, is on the inside of the pipe rather than the outside.

Not that either side of a sewer pipe is especially attractive anyway.

The process is called "cured in place pipe lining," and the city's public works department has been using it for a decade to extend the life of pipes and to avoid having to dig them up and replace them, a costly task that also tears up streets.

The city's contractor — PEC Corporation of Helena, Montana, has been the low bidder for the past few years, including 2018 — installs a resin-impregnated felt liner inside existing pipes, said Tom Fisk, operations supervisor for the public works department.

Garcia, 21, is alleged to have started a fire in adjoining buildings on Washington Street in Huntington on May 23. One arson count alleges the defendant, by intentionally starting the fire, caused over \$50,000 in damages to the Streamliner Lounge and Howell's Café located at 40 East Washington St., according to a press release from District Attorney Matt Shirtcliff. These businesses are owned by Michael Wiley.

The other arson count alleges the defendant, by starting the fire, caused damage greater than \$50,000 to Grady's Tavern at 20 East Washington St., which is owned by Tim and Lillian Mathews. The reckless burning count alleges that the fire the defendant set to the businesses on Washington Street also caused damage to Huntington Bait and Tackle Shop on 165 First St. East, owned by Robert Wilcox.

Garcia was arraigned Monday in Baker County Circuit Court and bail was set at \$100,000. It is full bail,

meaning Garcia can't be released by posting 10% of the amount. Garcia is scheduled to enter a plea on June 25 at 1:30 p.m.

Shirtcliff said Tuesday that the investigation is continuing.

First-degree arson, a Class A felony, does not carry a mandatory minimum sentence. Shirtcliff said Garcia could, however, face up to three years in prison on each of those charges upon conviction.

The reckless burning charge is a Class A misdemeanor.

The application was filed on behalf of New Directions by Scott Marshall, an architect for Straightline Architects of Boise, the project

minimum-security prison's substance abuse program for inmates.

New Directions also operates a treatment facility for parents with children 6 and younger.

The organization runs

Total Health, an outpatient program for mental health, substance abuse and pain management in the west wing of Saint Alphonsus Medical Center, a block or so north of the building site at 13th and K.
