Reforesting Areas Burned In 2015 Cornet-Windy Ridge Fire

Building A Forest

Cliff DeMastus kneels to caress the slender green needles of a foot-high ponderosa pine tree that faces death from half a dozen directions.

This fragile seedling, long before it casts a shadow wider than a ball cap, could be scorched by the summer sun or desiccated by drought.

It might be gobbled by an elk or deer, or yanked from the soil by a gopher, its doomed roots dragged through the dust like an unruly mop of hair.

And even if it survives this gantlet and makes it to adolescence, this pine and its neighbors might suffer the same fate as tens of thousands of its coniferous cousins have suffered over the past 30 years here on the slopes of Dooley Mountain about a dozen miles south of Baker City.

Fire.

Or, rather, fires.

Twice in this generation in July 1989 and in August 2015 — wind-driven flames from lightning-sparked fires have transformed swathes of healthy trees into skeletons in this corner of the Wallowa-Whitman National Forest.

Many of these remnants

from the more recent blaze, the Cornet-Windy Ridge fire, still stand, scraps of blackened bark sloughing from their trunks and scattered about their bases.

It is DeMastus' job to try to ensure that a forest will rise again in this place.

Whether these fledgling pines will ever stand tall and straight, their boles wide enough that a passer-by could sit for a spell, back pressed against the species' aromatic orange bark, is beyond his ability to predict, or to determine.

NORTH POWDER — Tuesday was a big day in North Powder.
