Findley wants to take Bentz's place

State representative for Baker County hopes to take Bentz's seat in the Senate

Lynn Findley has stepped once into Cliff Bentz's seat in the Oregon Legislature, and Findley believes he's the clear choice to do so again.

Findley, a Republican from Vale who represents House District 60, which includes Baker County, announced Wednesday that he will seek the Republican nomination in the May 2020 primary for state Senate District 30, which

also includes Baker County.
