Carmen was born on Jan. 10, 1952, to Robert "Bob" Lewis and Esther (Jeffords) Lewis at Enterprise. She was the oldest of three children; brothers, Vearl and Bobb Lewis followed.

Carmen grew up in beautiful Wallowa County, hanging out with her brothers, grandparents and cousins and watching her brothers play sports. She was involved in 4-H, participating in cooking, sewing and showing Hereford steers, which were raised on her grandfather's ranch.

She enjoyed comparing pictures of her prize winning Hereford steer with her granddaughters' prize winning Angus steers. She graduated from Wallowa High School, Class of 1970.

Carmen met her husband, Rodney "Rod" Wickam, at the park in Baker City. They married Dec. 18, 1971, at a small ceremony in Wallowa.

They had three children. In July 1972 they welcomed their first daughter, Rhonda Kay; in July 1975 their second daughter, Heidi Marie;

and son, Adam Charles, completed the family in January 1981.

She and Rod started raising their family in a small house on Grove Street, before moving to Elgin. They returned to Keating Valley where they lived for many years before moving into Baker. Through her children, she kept her love of 4-H going as their 4-H leader for many years.

Carmen started volunteering at the Baker County Public Library in September 1986 and was hired full time on June 30, 1988. She worked faithfully for 30 years, retiring on June 30, 2018, as the library administrative manager.

She loved to read mystery novels and to be the first person to open the pages of a new book. In her free time she loved being "Gram" to her two granddaughters Morgan Marie and Carley Kay; going to softball, volleyball and 4-H events, making cookies, breads or teaching the fine art of shelving books.

Carmen and Rod enjoyed going to their cabin and gardening. They took many "drive abouts," seeing Oregon, Wyoming, Colorado, Washington, Canada, the Dakotas and all over the mountains of Eastern Oregon. In December 2018, they celebrated their 47th wedding anniversary having pizza overlooking the Pacific Ocean from Kauai.

She was preceded in death by parents, Robert and Esther Lewis; grandparents, Edgar and Effie Lewis and Wendell and Myrtle Jeffords.

Alta Rose Moore

Formerly of Haines, 1917-2019

Alta Rose Moore, 102, of Union, died Nov. 5, 2019, at Pioneer Place in Vale.

A memorial will take place in the spring, her favorite season.

Known as Rose, and to many as Rosie, she was born July 2, 1917, at Haines to Thomas H. and Myrtle E. (Maxwell) Christensen. Rose attended school at Muddy Creek until her second year of high school, when her family bought a home in Haines. She graduated from high school in Haines in 1935.

After high school, Rose moved to Modesto, California, and spent 13 years there. She returned to Haines in 1949. She worked as a waitress and desk clerk at the Geiser Grand Hotel in Baker City and as a clerk at the Haines Post Office.

In her younger years, Rose played the pump organ and piano at the Haines Baptist Church. In Modesto, she played the piano at the Grace Baptist Church and was an accompanist for the soloists at the church and on the radio.

In 1953, Rose married Ernest S. "Pat" Moore. They moved to the Snake River in 1957 and she worked as a clerk at the Homestead Post Office and helped at the grocery store. While living in Homestead, Rose and Pat's son, Ernest T. "Tom" Moore, was born. After leaving the post office she began cooking at the Hells Canyon Inn and later leased the cafe at the Halfway Hotel.

In 1966, Rose and Pat divorced, and she moved with Tom to North Powder. Rose leased the cafe at the North Powder Motel, which she operated until August 1967 when she and Tom moved to Union. Rose cooked at The Hut Cafe until she retired and continued to live in Union until her death.

Rose is survived by her son and daughter-in-law, Tom and Donna of Clyde, Alberta, Canada; her stepdaughter, Carol Ashby of John Day; four grandchildren; two step-grandchildren and three step-great-grandchildren; and many nieces and nephews and great-nieces and great-nephews.

She was preceded in death by her parents, Thomas and Myrtle Christensen; her sister and brother-in-law, Myrtle Marie and Joe Carroll of Richland, Washington; her ex-husband, Ernest "Pat" Moore; her stepchildren, Paul Moore of Richland, Wilbur Ashby of John Day, Jerry Moore of John Day, and Mil-lie Saunders of Alaska; her nephew, Dan Moore; and her nieces, Brenda Coulter and JoDell Mitchell.
