Blazers' road woes continue

MILWAUKEE — The Milwaukee crowd greeted Carmelo Anthony with a loud ovation when the 10-time All-Star was introduced before the game. It cheered louder after the Bucks extended their winning streak to six straight.

Giannis Antetokounmpo had his second triple-double of the season and Milwaukee beat Anthony and the short-handed Portland Trail Blazers 137-129 on Thursday night.

Antetokounmpo had 24 points, 19 rebounds and a career-high 15 assists to lead the Bucks to their seventh win in the last nine games against Portland.

Eric Bledsoe added 30 points and six assists in

the Bucks' highest-scoring game of the season.

After scoring 10 points on 4-of-14 shooting in 24 minutes in his season debut Tuesday night against the Pelicans, Anthony had 10 points in the first half Thursday. Anthony finished with 18 points (6-of-15 shooting) and seven rebounds for the Trail Blazers, who were without Hassan Whiteside (hip), Damian Lillard (back), Zach Collins (shoulder) and Jusuf Nurkic (leg).

McCollum scored 37 points and Skal Labissiere added 22 points, 12 rebounds and five blocks for Portland. The Trail Blazers lost their third straight game overall and their sixth straight in Milwaukee.

Beavers top UCSB

CORVALLIS — Tres Tinkle is averaging a double-double this season, and Oregon State's senior forward did nothing to hurt those numbers in a 78-67 victory over UC Santa Barbara on Wednesday night.

Tinkle scored 27 points on 9-of-15 shooting, grabbed 11 rebounds and had three assists. The Beavers (4-1) never trailed.

Tinkle moved past former teammate Stephen Thompson Jr. into fourth place on the school's career scoring list.

He had plenty of help against the Gauchos (1-3)

Ethan Thompson added 16 points, and Alfred Hollins scored all 13 of his points in the second half.

Oregon State (4-1) extended a 34-27 halftime lead to as many as 19 points in the second half.

"I felt early on we were getting what we wanted if we were executing and running our stuff," Tres Tinkle said.

Pipeline protesters sit in Gov's office

SALEM (AP) — Demonstrators opposed to a liquefied natural gas pipeline and a marine export terminal in Oregon flooded into the Oregon State Capitol on Thursday and staged a sit-in at the governor's office before police moved in to arrest them.

The hundreds of protesters demanded Gov. Kate Brown, a Democrat, oppose the project they say will encourage further use of fossil fuels that leads to global warming, and risk spoiling the

land and ocean with spills.

The Jordan Cove Project, proposed by Pembina Pipeline Corporation of Canada, says it will bring investments, property tax revenue and jobs.

Oregon State Police did not intervene until Thursday night, when a trooper asked the several dozen protesters remaining in the governor's office to leave voluntarily. Instead, they locked arms, video shown on the protesting group's Facebook page showed.

"People from the sit-in are being arrested," the group, Southern Oregon Rising Tide, said.

The protesters had first gathered under the rotunda, singing "we got the power." Several dozen went into Brown's outer office, chanting "Gov. Brown, do your job."

The protesters, most wearing red T-shirts that said "power past fracked gas," listened to speeches in the governor's office and sang.

In a letter to the Board seeking support, Witty described the proposal as a "new charter initiative for Baker School District 5J around the concept of international education."

In his presentation, Joseph described how the program would prepare Baker students to lead the way as they learn to collaborate with others throughout the world and others learn to collaborate with them. The international charter school would be housed at Baker High School.

Joseph said research shows that there are socio-emotional development advantages for students who study abroad and that they outperform those who don't have those opportunities.

The five-year goal for the program is to progressively enroll up to 40 international high school students and

a similar number of Baker students in the program by 2024-25.

The Oregon International School would create "programs that foster globally minded citizens eager to engage others from around the world in friendship, business, and to solve problems," Joseph stated in his presentation.

It also would provide affordable study abroad opportunities for students and staff as well as a possible new revenue stream that would benefit all District students, he said.

The curriculum would emphasize college writing and research skills. Collaborative problem-based projects would be part of every core class, including math, social studies, science and English, Joseph said. And every graduating senior would be required to complete a capstone project.

The program is hoping to develop sister school relationships to encourage parallel

curriculum study in both Districts.

Baker High School has in recent years hosted students from Denmark, Norway, Germany, Italy, China, South Korea and Cambodia. During the past three years, the District also has hosted about 25 students and teachers from China. A group of six Baker High School students and four adults will be visiting Vietnam March 18-30, Joseph said.

More information about the objectives and rationale of the program will be presented in a public meeting to be scheduled later by the Board, according to an executive summary overview of the plan presented to the Board Thursday. The Board will receive more information at its January meeting as well, Witty said.

Joseph said international students are showing interest in the Baker School District's programs such as its

new computer and ESports classes, health sciences, nursing programs and others offered through Baker Technical Institute.

"What we are strategically trying to do to compete is to focus on the learning," Joseph said. "We want to put people together from all walks of life to work on real problems that they are concerned about."

Kari Anderson, a BHS math teacher, spoke about another innovative program the District is considering to help students put their math skills to use in practical application.

Anderson attended a training in Denver in June in which she learned new skills on how to engage students in math through teaching geometry in construction classes offered through career and technical training programs.

Anderson said the classes are not new, they are just delivered in a different way that keeps students engaged in the process.
