The Sloans Ridge fire blossomed from a slow-moving 40-acre blaze Thursday morning into a 1,460 -acre inferno Thursday night.
It is no longer a prescribed natural fire - one the U.S. Forest Service monitors rather than fights. Instead, the Wallowa-Whitman National Forest has retardant-dropping airplanes and two water-dropping try to prevent the blaze from spreading any farther south and east.

It's burning near the spine of Jim White Ridge. That's about a mile and a half west of the Minam River So far the fire has spread over just half an acre
But Ruby said Monday that he won't be surprised if the blaze, aided by a couple more weeks of relatively warm, dry weather, creeps into a nearby thicket of mature subalpine firs.

Bill married Mary in 1960 nd had three children: Steven, Kathleen and Stacy. By the mid-1960s they moved to San Mateo, California, in the Bay area, where they lived or five years.
In 1972, looking for better schools, cleaner air and a smaller city, the family moved to Pendleton, Oregon, where Mary had a sister.
