#### **50 YEARS AGO** from the Democrat-Herald **September 20, 1971**

#### 10 YEARS AGO from the Baker City Herald **September 21, 2011**

Representatives of the Oregon Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) visited Baker City Tuesday to discuss local officials' concerns regarding expensive sewer and water projects looming in the future.

For example, Baker City plans to pipe treated effluent from its sewage treatment lagoons several miles across Baker Valley to a manmade marsh at Baldock Slough because DEQ likely will prohibit the city from continuing to divert the effluent into the Powder River.

#### **ONE YEAR AGO** from the Baker City Herald **September 22, 2020**

The EltrymTheatre marquee hasn't lit up for months, but that all changed on Friday, Sept. 18.

Owner Terry McQuisten reopened Baker City's Ione movie house to bring a sense of normalcy to her life and to downtown Baker City.

"It's amazing how much difference it made to have a routine," she said. "I had the smell of popcorn, the lights are on, and the doors are open. It feels normal."

The theater closed in mid-March due to the coronavirus pandemic.

Although the Eltrym showed films over the weekend, it's not fully open.

Ticket sales are limited to keep each theater at 25% capacity and to ensure required social distancing between audience members. That means 25 people in theater one (the biggest), and 13 people in each of the two smaller theaters.




