Baker hoops unbeaten on road trip

Baker's girls and boys varsity basketball teams continue to amass miles - and wins. After traveling across Oregon to play at Estacada on Dec. 10 and Molalla the next day, this past weekend the Bulldogs embarked on an even longer journey, to Klamath Falls. And just as with the previous trip, both

teams returned to Baker City with two wins. The Bulldogs swept games at Mazama on Friday, Dec. 17, and the next day at Klamath Union.

Both teams improved to 6-2.

Both teams also rose in the Class 4A rankings.

The boys team, which has won four straight, is now the top-ranked team by the

Oregon School Activities Association formula. The Baker girls, who have won five of their last six games and whose two losses were each by a single point, are ranked eighth.

The boys have only one game over the next two weeks - the Bulldogs are slated to travel to Pendleton tonight for a 6:30 p.m. tipoff.

The Baker girls will play host to Crane at 8 p.m. on Dec. 28.

Baker boys rise to No. 1 in **OSAA** rankings

The Baker boys basketball team sometimes needs one quarter of play to shift its offensive game into a higher gear.

But once the Bulldogs start accelerating, their opponents tend to quickly recede in the distance.

Baker followed that basic script in both of its wins during a trip to Klamath Falls this past weekend.

On Friday, Dec. 17 at Mazama High School, and the following day at Klamath Union, the Bulldogs were tied after the first eight minutes.

And in both games Baker pulled ahead in the second quarter and never trailed again.

The Bulldogs were especially efficient in their 82-49 rout of Klamath Union, dominating the final three quarters.

The previous night's 64-53 win over Mazama was more competitive, but the Vikings never seriously threatened in the final quarter as Baker made 10 of 14 free throws when Mazama committed multiple fouls to try to slow the game down.

Baker girls improve to 6-2

Bulldogs prevail against Mazama, Klamath Union

Just two days after a heartbreaking onepoint loss to Fruitland on their home court, the Baker Bulldogs shrugged off the disappointment to beat a pesky Mazama team in Klamath Falls on Friday, Dec. 17.

After leading just 20-18 at halftime, the Baker girls flexed their defensive muscles in the second half, holding the Vikings to just 13 points and rolling to a 47-31 win.

"Mazama's a pretty good basketball team," Baker assistant coach Jason Ramos said. "We took control in the second half, especially on defense. We were able to get some momentum in the third quarter and extend the lead. Definitely defense was the highlight of the Friday game against Mazama.'

Junior Jozie Ramos scored seven of her game-high 22 points in the decisive third quarter, and fellow junior Brooklyn Jaca scored four points as the Bulldogs boosted their lead to 33-25 entering the final quarter.

Jaca and two other juniors, Makenzie Flanagan and Macey Moore, each finished with six points.

Baker 60, Klamath Union 33

Despite an 11 a.m. tipoff on Saturday, Dec. 18, Baker rolled early against the Pelicans, leading 21-7 after the first quarter.

Junior Skylar Roy gave Baker a major boost off the bench, making all four of her free throws in the first quarter.

Klamath Union rallied in the second quarter, outscoring Baker 15-10 to cut the lead to 31-22 at halftime.

But the Bulldogs quickly did away with any prospects of a Pelican comeback with a dominating 17-4 performance in the third quarter.

Roy scored six more points and finished with a season-high 10.

Ramos had a game-high 18 points, Moore had 14, and junior Rylee Elms had 10 points.

Jason Ramos said the Bulldogs were much more efficient offensively in both weekend games compared with the 41-40 loss to Fruitland, leading to multiple easy baskets.

Isaiah Jones and Jaxon Logsdon — but the Pelicans kept pace and the score was tied at 16.

But Baker eschewed the long shots in the second quarter, scoring most of its 23 points inside or from the free throw line, largely as a result of aggressive drives to the basket.

Baker coach Jebron Jones said that although he doesn't discourage his players from taking open 3-pointers, he also emphasizes that shots from behind the line are only part of the team's arsenal.

"I told the kids that most teams live or die by the 3-point shot, and we're not going to be one of those teams," Jones said. "It's easy to settle for a 3-pointer, but when we attack the rim we force the team to either stop us or foul us.'

As Baker rolled to a 39-29 lead at halftime, Jaron Long had seven points in the second quarter, while Isaiah Jones, Hudson Spike and Grant Gambleton had five each.

Baker scored 23 more points in the third quarter to extend its lead to 62-44.

Eight Bulldogs scored during the quarter, and 10 Baker players got on the board during the game.

That exemplifies the brand of selfless play that Jebron Jones prefers — and it's a style that's perfectly suited to this team, he said.

"We are balanced, and there are multiple guys who can put the ball in the hoop,' he said. "That makes it hard to defend us."

Long had 18 points to lead four Bulldogs in double figures against the Pelicans. Hobson had 12

six, Gambleton and Maddox Charbonneau five each, Lane Molina four, and Diego Quintela three.

Baker 64, Mazama 53

Isaiah Jones had eight of his game-high 23 points in the first quarter, and Spike took over in the second quarter with 10 of his 15 points, including a pair of 3-pointers, as Baker took a 30-26 lead at the break.

Jones had six points, and Logsdon five, as Baker outscored the Vikings 17-10 in the third quarter to extend its lead to 47-36 entering the final quarter.

Jebron Jones said he believes Baker, with 10 or 11 players getting meaningful minutes, is able to wear down its opponents.

"We have great depth and versatility," Jones said.

Winning streak

Since its two losses — 60-58 at Fruitland on Dec. 7, and 57-52 to Homedale on Dec. 9 in the Baker gym – the Bulldogs have averaged 77 points in their four games and twice topped 80 points.

Jebron Jones said the Bulldogs are starting to consistently play at the fast pace he prefers.

"I think they are starting to see the benefits of maintaining a good pace offensively and the benefits of sharing the basketball," he said. "The kids are taking great shots. They're becoming more comfortable with each other and becoming more and more confident in themselves.'

Jones said a win tonight at Pendleton would be a nice early gift for Baker as they start their Christmas

in a rematch at 7 p.m.

As for Baker's number one ranking, Jones said he doesn't pay attention to that, not this early in the season. "It's just a number," he

said.
