# Melissa Fumero OF ‘BLOCKBUSTER’ ON NETFLIX

**Were you a Blockbuster customer back in the day? Any memories of a local store?**

Oh yeah, we had one. I grew up in a pretty small town in New Jersey and we had a Blockbuster in our town, in our shopping center by the Shop Rite. And I remember where it was. It looked exactly like our set on the show does (laughs) and that was a part of growing up, those weekends where you’d go on Friday night. Everyone would go and pick out a movie for the weekend and my brother and I would fight over which movies we wanted to get.

And I remember going as a teenager by myself a few times and I feel like my teen years was when it started to kind of phase out and I remember it might have closed when I was in college. And at the time, being like, “Oh yeah, well that makes sense. Now we get our DVDs in the mail.” Like I was an early Netflix customer where I used to get the DVDs in the mail (laughs) and I go, “Oh, that’s easier.” But then as more time goes on, you go, “Oh man, I kind of miss going to the video store, that experience.”
