

In the Early Days

In an obituary of James Ann Hamblock in last week's Western World, we find the following interesting scraps of local history:

In crossing mountains from Treka they came by way of Roseburg and Mr. and Mrs. Hamblock not having horses enough they fixed saddles to six of the oxen in order to assist in carrying the articles necessary for the comfort of the family and to let the women in the party ride.

This being an entirely new feature to the cattle, as soon as the girth was tightened, they ran away and the household goods were scattered and with difficulty recovered. Finally they arrived in safety at Port Orford, and located two and one half miles north of there, taking up a squatter's claim.

In the early days Mr. and Mrs. Hamblock had a large dance hall and the settlers would come miles to attend a dance. Some of them even coming from Myrtle Point in a small skiff.

Mrs. Hamblock had the first sewing machine in Coos county and was an expert needle woman. Her hand work was so fine it was impossible to see the stitches. She took great delight in her work and was truly an artist.

Let's All Write to Them

No man lives who can work without encouragement, and we hope that the people of Coos and Curry counties will remember that Senator Charles Hall is entitled to their support and encouragement. He has sowed his intentions to undertake two herculean tasks, that of obtaining an appropriation from the state for the immediate completion of the paving from Coquille to Roseburg. This is a measure which should meet with immediate endorsement but it will be fought to the limit. Coos county has given in to others time and again always for the road game in Oregon, and our time has come. The other task he will undertake is to pass a bill authorizing the immediate expenditure of the \$2,500,000 bond issue voted for the Roosevelt highway. Senator Hall believes that the state should start work and in the meantime seek federal assistance, which he believes will be forthcoming by the time we are ready for it. We urge our people to write Senator Hall, tell him you are for these measures. Also write Representatives T. T. Bennett and S. P. Pierce urging them to work for these measures when considered by the House.—Coos Bay Harbor.

Boy Sent Back Home

Charles Swarles, a Marshfield youth, who enlisted in the army and was sent to Portland Saturday on his way to an encampment, was stopped at Portland by telegraphic order of Sergeant Ridgeway, the recruiting officer in this city. The boy's father, who saw in the newspaper that his son had enlisted, objected on the grounds that the boy was not of age and had not secured his consent.

The recruiting officer said that the boy represented his parents were elsewhere and made representations that warranted him in taking the enlistment but when he found the facts from the father ordered the boy stopped. He will either be sent back to Marshfield and made to pay the expense of the trip or else will be released in Portland to make his own way home.—Coos Bay Times.

Myrtle Point's Fecundity

Dr. E. A. Leep, registrar of District 214, comprising Myrtle Point and vicinity, gives the American some interesting vital statistics for the year 1920.

In that year there were 81 births—42 girls and 39 boys. During the same period 85 deaths were recorded.

In 1918 there were 57 births and 41 deaths.

In 1919 there were 61 births and 36 deaths.

The year 1920 showed a far greater number of births than in either of the preceding years, and fewer deaths.

Compared with 1918 there were an even dozen more babies born and half a dozen fewer deaths, which is a very gratifying showing from a health standpoint, and also in the matter of increasing population.

We cannot give the exact figures for Coquille as we have no weather observer here, but McKinley had 17.86 inches for December, while Bandon with only 11.29 inches seems to have been considerable of a slacker, though she increased her last year's record of 9.61 inches by nearly 20 per cent. Since Sept. 1st, 40 inches is reported at Coos Bay and 49.20 at McKinley while Bandon lags with 29.65. There is probably where the disappointment comes in, for any one who would complain that even eleven inches for December is not "up to expectations" must be hard to suit.

Beaver Slough Dredging Project No. 1

Beaver Slough Dredging Projects Nos. 2 and 3.

Notice is hereby given that not later than 10 o'clock a. m., January 25, 1921, the County Court will receive bids for Beaver Slough Dredging Projects Nos. 2 and 3 as follows:

Bids may be made upon Projects Nos. 1, 2 or 3 separately, or Projects 2 and 3 may be joined, but bids upon Project No. 1 shall be made separately. Project No. 2 shall consist of a dike approximately one-half mile in length across Beaver Slough in a general east and west direction on the newly acquired right of way secured for the North Bank Road, and bids therefor shall be by the yard. Project No. 3 will be a dike one-fourth of a mile more or less in length across what is known as "Pitt Marsh," running in a general north and south direction, and is located on the right of way acquired by the County, or the road known as the North Bank Road, the successful bidder to provide his own access of approach for his machinery to this piece of work.
