**Here's A Questionnaire**  
(From Farm Bureau News)

Those who are required to put up lunches daily are sometimes at a loss to find variety in sandwich fillings, which is the universal foundation of the cold lunch.

School children also like variety. It not only gives them pleasure of mind to find a surprise but also gives added zest to the appetite. When sandwiches are daintily made, (not too much bread for the filling), less bread crusts will be found on the school ground and by the roadside.

Following are a few sandwich fillings which are both nutritious and good:

1. Equal parts raisins and nuts chopped fine and mixed with salad dressing.
2. Pimento cheese. A can of pimento cheese may be made to go farther and will be more moist if mixed with a half cup of thick cream or one-half cup of milk thickened with 1 1/2 tablespoons flour. While the milk is still hot, melt the cheese in the thickened paste, season and when cool, use for filling.
3. A filling of brown sugar mixed with creamed butter is delicious for either white or brown bread.
4. A filling of three eggs, 1/4 cup chopped boiled ham, and salad dressing to moisten.
5. Equal parts of hard cooked eggs and minced celery moistened with dressing.
6. Chopped raisins and peanut butter. It may be necessary to add a little cream or milk to the peanut butter.
7. One cup cheese and 1/4 cup nut meats moistened with cream.
8. Lettuce, nut meats and salad dressing.
9. Salmon and nuts.
10. Cottage cheese and chopped pickles.
11. Chopped celery sandwiches.
12. Plain jelly.
