### Highway Matters at Salem

Here is the way the legislative correspondent of the Portland Journal sized up the highway situation in the legislature on Tuesday of this week.

For the Roosevelt highway, \$2,500,000.

For the Dallas-California highway, \$2,500,000.

For the completion of the remainder of the state highway program all the money that is left after the two highways named above get their total joint cut of \$5,000,000.

That is what Senator Hall is supposed to have had in mind yesterday when he moved to reconsider the vote by which his own Roosevelt highway bill was passed by the senate on Friday. And it was what Senator Norblad was thinking about when he moved that the bill, after its reconsideration, be returned to the senate committee on roads and highways for further consideration and probable amendment.

In other words, Eastern Oregon and the coast counties want \$5,000,000 in highway bonds to be pledged to their joint account. The Eastern Oregon men came down to the legislature full of the idea that the legislature should make definite provision for the completion of Eastern Oregon roads, or at least that some definite portion of the highway funds would be spent upon their highways before all of the bond money was gone.

Then Senator Hall from Coos and Senator Norblad from Clatsop, one at one end and one at the other of the proposed Roosevelt highway, joined forces to put the Roosevelt highway bill across. Now with defeat staring the Roosevelt highway bill as it passed the senate in the face, Senators Hall and Norblad have backed up a little, but in backing up have hooked up a lot of votes from Eastern Oregon on the Roosevelt-The Dallas California highway schemes.

The bill when it is amended in the senate highway committee is to be brought out upon the floor of the senate once more additionally garnished with the provision that it is to be submitted to the voters of the state for approval or rejection at the next general or special election and in the hope that it will have no trouble so far as the legislature is concerned.

The program, if it carried out according to plans, will undoubtedly be the signal for a general onslaught upon the state highway map which has been zealously guarded since its enactment in 1917. The special session of 1920 saw what could be accomplished by the legislature in the way of attempted alterations of the map, and, if the present session once gets started to writing new highways on the landscape it would be difficult to predict where it would stop.

As Billy Swape might remark, though from a different viewpoint perhaps, "It's beginning to look like the good old days" so far as the road program is concerned.

### Shot Through the Heart

Ed Wilson was shot through the heart and instantly killed at North Bend, Tuesday afternoon by J. B. Stevens, a newspaper man, who is known as "Oklahoma Ed." The tragedy occurred at the Alpine Bungalow house on Sherman avenue in the center of the business district. The place was formerly known as "Our House," and was owned at one time by Wilson, the victim of the shooting.

Probably the only witness to the shooting was Mrs. Lillian Wilson, the divorced wife of the man who was killed. Mrs. Wilson conducted the hotel and it is said that Stevens had been stopping there. Possible jealousy over the woman is the only motive the officers have been able to suggest and this theory is based on rumors of Stevens having told Wilson to stay away from the place.

Wilson had been living in a house on Pony slough. For several years Wilson is said to have been engaged in bootlegging and there is a story that recently Stevens had been associated with him in the selling of liquor.

The shooting occurred within the hotel, probably in the front hall. Immediately after the shot was fired Wilson opened the door and staggered out and started down the front steps. He took hold of a post on the porch, reeled and crumpled up at the bottom of the steps leading to the sidewalk—Coos Bay Times.

### Home Brew Spilled

Twenty gallons of home made wine was poured out onto the wharf at the rear of Justice F. J. Chaburn's office Monday evening and gradually oozed away through the cracks to contaminate the waters of the Coquille, says the Bandon World. It was the supply seized by the Sheriff's office last week when the latter was placed under arrest.

A large crowd gathered to witness the ceremony and when Constable Goodman drew the cork and the mellow liquor gurgled forth the expressions of the onlookers furnished considerable amusement. One or two tried to sneak a taste but the watchman at the helm, whose experience in running down the illicit stuff has made him a reputation, was too clever at manipulating the keg.

To contain 11 per cent alcohol sounded rich to the fellow with the longing for a kick, but one smell of the stuff was enough for most of them. The old copper drip can in the days of the saloon was as perfume compared with this concoction. Only nature knows the kindness of the law that called for its destruction.

### Oregonian Resent

Secretary W. A. Reid, of the Marshfield Chamber of Commerce, has sent to all of the Portland newspapers the following telegram resenting the action of the Oregonian regarding the Roosevelt Highway:

"We, the people of Southwestern Oregon, strongly resent the attitude taken by the Portland Oregonian in its fight against the Roosevelt Highway. The building of this coast highway is vital to this Southwestern Oregon section as well as a benefit to the entire State.

"We feel that the coast section of the State has not been given the consideration to which it is justly entitled. California furnishes us a market for practically all our products and has always shown a disposition to more than meet us half way, being more considerate of the needs of this section of the State than is Portland, which is now getting approximately 90 per cent of our trade. We protest that the attitude of the Oregonian is unfair in view of the fact that we are urged to support and demand Oregon made products and in return have reason to expect the support of Portland and the entire state in this and every project for the legitimate development of Southwestern Oregon.

Mr. Reid is asking the different merchants to telegraph their wholesalers and jobbers asking them where they stand on the matter of the highway. He suggested that the following telegram be sent:

"We strongly resent the attitude of the Oregonian against the Roosevelt Highway which is vitally essential to the coast country, opening a vast and rich agricultural section now practically inaccessible. Portland now gets ninety percent of our business which California is now striving for as she furnishes a market for all our products. Is our business worth anything? If so where do you stand and what are you going to do about it? We demand immediate action."
