Made a New Man of Him

A Bend press dispatch dated yesterday tells the following rejuvenation story:

The first interstitial gland operation in central Oregon, so far as can be learned, was performed in Bend by a local physician, it was ascertained today. H. A. Haggett, the 76-year-old patient, is showing marked improvement since acquiring the glands of a healthy young goat.

While the operation was not for the usual purpose of rejuvenation, being undertaken as a last resort in the hope of affecting a cure for a chronic asthmatic condition, indications are that the patient is younger in fact if not in years. His blood pressure has fallen from 180 to 138, the muscles of his arms, until a few days ago soft and flabby, are becoming firm and strong, and he no longer suffers from insomnia. The severity of his asthmatic attacks has greatly abated.

Haggett readily gave his consent to the use of his name in making public the results of the operation.
