#### J. O. Stemmler Fails

J. O. Stemmler, well known lawyer and millman of Myrtle Point, has filed a petition in bankruptcy. The papers reached A. H. Derbyshire, referee in bankruptcy, at North Bend Wednesday and March 28th has been fixed as the date of the first hearing of creditors.

Mr. Stemmler lists liabilities totalling \$16,548.42 and assets totalling \$16,480.30. He claims total exemption of \$370.50 which includes his law library valued at \$330.50.

His creditors are mostly Myrtle Point people and firms. They include B. C. Shull, Olive Shull, Mary Alice Luttrell, W. D. Hale, Carl O. Peterson, Catherine Stemmler, Geo. Bryant, K Leep, Dr. L. G. Johnson and the Title Co.

Mr. Stemmler was manager of the Myrtle Point Mill & Lumber Co., which became involved last fall.— Tmies.

It seems a pity that a man whose assets will come so near covering his liabilities, and especially a man of Mr. Stemmler's standing in the community, should not be able to make some arrangement to satisfy his creditors without resorting to the bankruptcy court.

The result was that the bill was so entirely different a proposition by the time it was passed, that its own father would never have recognized it as the same bantling.
