Some Years Yet

Those who assume that it will be possible to complete the Roseburg to the California line road by way of the Coquille Valley, in a year or two, will get a new vision of the obstacles to be overcome when they read the following about the Curry county portion of that road.

The Gold Beach Reporter in reporting a meeting of the Chamber of Commerce of that place says:

"It developed during Judge Wood's talk that the probable cost of constructing the ninety-six miles of road from the Coos county to the California line will be somewhere in the neighborhood of \$2,000,000. This one fact alone means that the road can not be completed within the next year or the year following as a great many contend should be the case. It is a big undertaking and will consume several years in building, yet the main point to keep in mind is that the road will eventually be completed even though the work is not done fast enough for the more impatient. The additional fact that the expenditure of the \$2,000,000 will be spread out over a number of years is sufficient to insure prosperous times throughout the entire period, so that there should be no kick on that score.

"This year, possibly in June, the state highway commission will let the contract for the stretch of road south of the present improvement on Brushy creek, eliminating the Linnville hill. It is estimated this work will cost in the neighborhood of \$110,000, of which sum the county's share is to be \$19,000, the balance of that portion of the old bond issue authorized to be expended in the northern end of the county.

"The next proposition in line is the road between here and Pistol river, which has been designated a market road by the county court. Judge Wood stated that in all probability the court would devote a portion of this year's market road fund to graveling the Elk river market road in order to make it passable for traffic at all seasons of the year. The remainder of the fund will then be used in surveying the route from here south. This work is to be done by the state highway commission and the route selected will ultimately become a section of the coast highway. It is probable that the market road money will be applied on this project for the next two or three years.

"In order that the county may be prepared to do its full share, the members of the club were unanimously of the opinion that the question of issuing additional road bonds under the six per cent limitation law should be submitted to the voters at the special election in June.

"During the discussion it developed that the highway commission splits the maintenance cost of roads built under their supervision 50-50 with the counties. With the entire coast road in this county improved and graveled, it is estimated that the cost of keeping it up would amount to about \$40,000 a year, of which amount the state would pay half. This would certainly be a great deal cheaper than the cost of maintaining the present road, to say nothing of the improved traveling facilities."

Items From Arago.

The Arago Cheese Factory began operations Wednesday with Mr. Frank Mosier as manufacturer. The factory has had a number of substantial improvements, both inside and to the outer surroundings, which will add much to the looks and sanitary conditions.

There was a large representation of the farmers from here, both League and anti-League dairymen, which met at Coquille for a general discussion of the dairy business on Wednesday.

There was a very large attendance at the entertainment and basket lunch at the Arago school house Saturday night. The proceeds were \$144.00. Much praise was expressed for the entertainment and all appeared to have enjoyed the evening.

Disclaim Any Responsibility

In the following letter received by L. L. Turner, of this city, the field representative of the Nestle Food Co. in this territory, disdains all responsibility on the part of that company for the resolution said to have been adopted by a minority of the Community Club of Bandon favoring the road over the Lampa hill as the route for the state highway from Roseburg to Bandon:

My dear Mr. Turner:—On my return to Coquille yesterday I learned of the unfortunate controversy that has arisen between Coquille and Bandon over the route of the highway between those two cities and also that the Nestle Food Co.'s name has been dragged into the matter. This is entirely unwarranted for neither directly nor indirectly do we have anything to do with the resolution passed by the Community Club of Bandon to which I understand Coquille objects.

The locating of this particular highway is of paramount importance to the people of the two cities involved and affects their welfare so vitally that for any individual company in any way to interfere would seem to me the height of poor taste.

Naturally the Nestle Food Co. realizes the poor road conditions in the county and like everyone else knows the value of good roads but it is my personal opinion that when the principal places in the county are connected up with highways by whatever routes the people themselves select, that the improvement of cross and side roads will very quickly follow.
