#### Fine Timber Claims

Speaking of the late Timothy Billings, of the Myrtle Point neighborhood, who died recently at the age of 75 years and six months, the American says:

While living in the South Fork valley Mr. Billings acquired a claim said to have been the best quarter of standing timber in Oregon, and perhaps in the country. It was estimated to cruise 29,000,000 feet. He sold it several years ago, before timber became so valuable, for \$6,000, and the tract was cruised by the purchasers who estimated the holding at 31,000,000 feet. Meanwhile Mr. Billings had secured a coal claim in the same section, which has timber on it almost equal to that on his original quarter section. He owned this at the time of his death and it becomes the property of his heirs. He leaves a widow and a daughter nine years of age to mourn his death, besides three brothers and two sisters. His family will be well provided for through the property he left.
