THE BARRICADE IS TORN DOWN

Three young men were taken before Justice Stanley Saturday and fined \$10 apiece and costs, amounting to \$3.30 each for breaking through the barricade on the highway Friday on a trip back from Marshfield by auto. Going over they went out to the Watson ranch and up the logging road and so got through without disturbing the barrier or getting on the newer part of the highway.

Coming back they were stopped by several men, each the worse for the liquor they had consumed, who tore down the barricade and commanded that they be brought to town. The young men had not intended to violate the highway rules and had a team in readiness to pull them up the bank where their car wouldn't go under its own power out at Cunningham but after the road had been cleared of obstruction they followed the demands of their unsolicited passengers and drove on into town.

They paid their fines rather than fight the case, which the judge found them afterward they had successfully done. The real offenders were the drunks.

The complaints were made by the Scandia Co. foreman under orders from the highway engineer at Marshfield.

Schools Short of Teachers

Superintendent Mulkey, who has been gathering data on the teaching vacancies of next year, says that a partial canvass shows that approximately fifty per cent of the present teachers will not return next year.

Marshfield loses 12 out of 33; North Bend 11 out of 23; Myrtle Point 8 out of 12. Bandon, Coquille and Powers have not yet determined the number of vacancies, as all of the teachers who expect to return have not signed their contracts. On the river between Coquille and Bandon, at Riverton, Pakersburg, Randolph and Prosper, there are 10 teachers and only three of the ten are coming back next year.

Among the reasons given for not returning are marriage, further preparation and leaving the profession for various reasons. A greater percentage of the teachers canvassed expected to attend the Normal school than ever before. This will mean a temporary shortage, but ultimately a corps of better trained teachers, provided they return to Coos county when they finish their preparation.

Bandon Bonds Bought for

The Lumberman's Trust Co., of Portland, has purchased the Bandon municipal hydro-electric power bonds. The offer was on a basis of 95 cents on the dollar for the \$110,000 issue, which is five points below par. The bonds draw 6 per cent interest and according to the terms of the bid they are to be dated May 1, 1921, and are to be come due as follows: \$7000 per year between May 1, 1926, and May 1, 1939, both inclusive, and \$6,000 on May 1, 1940, and May 1, 1941. The bonds are to be delivered not later than June 21, 1921, and the bidder agrees to pay accrued interest on the bonds from the date of issue to the date of delivery. Another provision is that \$40,000 of the money from the sale of the bonds is to be kept on deposit with the Lumberman's Trust Co. bank at Portland until needed. On this 2 per cent interest is to be paid to the City of Bandon on daily balance.—Bandon World.

May Employ Watcher

County courts have a legal right, according to an opinion rendered by Attorney General Van Winkle, to employ a citizen of the county to sit in at the meetings of the State Highway Commission and use his influence relative to location of roads in the county. Such a representative cannot be paid out of the general fund, but may be paid out of the county highway fund.

No Exams In Agriculture

County School Superintendent C. E. Mulkey is in receipt of the following letter from State Superintendent Churchill:

"Pupils will not be required to pass an examination in agriculture either in the May or June eighth grade examination. No district of the first class now teaches the subject of agriculture, and the same may be said of many districts of the second class. The result is that the large majority of teachers going into rural districts from year to year have themselves had no course in agriculture. It is rather absurd to require pupils to pass an examination in a subject in which the teacher herself has had no preparation."

Mr. Mulkey says that there will be no examination in agriculture in either May or June. The May examination questions have already been received but there were no agricultural questions.

Eggs Higher Here

J. E. Norton says that this spring while eggs were selling at 14 cents at Roseburg they have never brought less than 25 cents here; and further that eggs are all the while being shipped in to Coos county, because the supply is never equal to the demand.
