Over a dozen of them... The court declared its intention to lay out a road up Willanch Slough and set Sept. 7 as the date on which they would hear any persons interested.

The petition of Dennis and Margaret Donovan to have their land excluded from the Coquille Drainage District because it was not swamp or overflowed land and the cost would be in excess of the benefits, was allowed and the same excluded from assessment. All other lands in the district are subject to the improvement assessment.

The report of the viewers was adopted declaring a public road from D to Tenth streets in Eastside to the end of E street, and damages of \$30 to E. L. Archambeau, \$10 to Margaret Wall and \$1 to the Eastside Land Co. were allowed.

All men working for the county are now covered by the State Workmen's Compensation Law, but the court believes the premiums are in excess of the benefits, and so instructed the district attorney to prepare an application to the State Compensation Department asking for a modification of the present arrangement so that quarry and powder men and bridge carpenters only would be included in the list of those coming under the operation of the Workmen's Compensation Law.

A call for bids was made for dredging the Glasgow end of the Roosevelt ferry over at the Bay, from the piling south to deep water. Application of Kruss & Banks to borrow \$15,100 from the sinking fund created to pay interest on the \$300,000 road bond issue of a few years ago, was approved. The next interest payment on the bonds is not due until June, 1932, and the court has \$10,000 in the fund now and will have another \$10,000 after the taxes are paid in October. The rate of interest will be 6 per cent and the county is secured by the deposit of Liberty bonds and real estate mortgages by Kruss & Banks.

Little Disease at Pueblo

Returns After Twenty Years

Logan Kay, who left here early last year for California for the business, Mrs. Kay's health, sends the following clipping from the San Jose Mercury Herald regarding a former Coos county ball player whom old timers will remember:

H. J. (Happy) Smith, heavy hitter and fast outfielder in the days when San Jose was in the old state league, is going to leave this city after a residence of 20-odd years and return to his former home place, Coquille, Oregon. With Mrs. Smith, who is a San Jose girl, he will return to the river country and scenes of enjoyment in youthful days.

"Happy" is well known to many veteran San Jose baseball fans and his departure provokes reminiscences of early days in local diamond history. He came here from Oregon, immediately made good on the San Jose team and later went up to the big leagues where he showed smarts with Brooklyn about 1910. He played when big salaries for ballplayers were unknown, one instance being cited as a game played at Santa Clara, in which Hal Chase took part. After the game Smith was given \$1 for his part in the affair. He knocked out four hits and drove in most of the runs for the locals and when he asked for a larger salary was told he should feel delighted for enjoying the privilege of wearing a uniform.

Mrs. and Mrs. Smith arrived in Coquille last Saturday.

League Shipping Cheese

The Oregon Dairymen's League Monday shipped 2047 cases of cheese to San Francisco on the steamer Curacao. This amounts to about 78 tons and represents a value of 17 cents a pound or about \$28,000, which is a nice sum of money to be distributed among the dairymen.

Of the shipment 1064 cases were made in the Marshall factory and 983 cases came from other factories of the league in this zone. All was first grade cheese—excepting 30 cases which are white suits on high a Standard. There were two brands, the Coos and Curry, and the Mellowood, the latter being one of the new brands the league is putting out.

This was one of the largest shipments of cheese that has gone from this locality for some time past. It is finding a ready market in San Francisco and the league expects to put out other large shipments this year.—Coos Bay Times.

Empty Bottle Causes Fire

This bottle started a forest fire, which, excepting for the dampness of the underbrush, might have spread to alarming proportions. Forest Ranger John S.
