Kookak Dam Largest in World

The Kookak dam at Kookak, is the largest power dam in the world, is located at the foot of the Des Moines rapids. The rapids are about 12 miles long, and have a fall of 98 feet. There are 30 turbines and electric generators, which produce a total of over 500,000 horsepower. The high power transmission lines run to various cities in the Mississippi valley, furnishing industries with power created by the Father of Waters. The cost figure was \$27,000,000.
