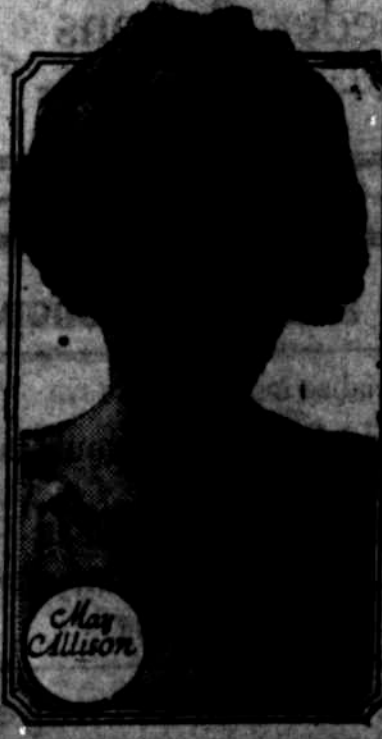

E. E. Campbell, a resident of Coquille for the past fourteen years, died at his home in the east part of town last Sunday at the age of 58 years, five months and thirteen days. The cause of his death was dropsy, with which he had suffered for the past six months.

The funeral services were conducted by Rev. Mr. Hanson, of the Church of God, at the Ellingson Chapel last Tuesday at 2 p. m. The interment was in the Masonic cemetery.

Elbert E. Campbell was born in Vermont, February 25, 1863. In 1884 he was married to Miss Luella Davis in Maine. To this union seven children were born: Mrs. Edith Gaffney, of Silverton; Mrs. Elsie Kneeland, of Portland; Mrs. Erma Harrison and Erving Campbell, of Marshfield, and Edwin, Ethel and Eleanor Campbell, of Coquille. All were here for the funeral except Mrs. Gaffney, who was unable to come.

Mr. and Mrs. Campbell had lived in New Hampshire and California before coming to Oregon. Mr. Campbell was a carpenter by trade, but had worked in the mill here during most of the past fourteen years.

Coquille Wins Great Game

That Coquille has the best team in the Coos County League at present was the unanimous opinion of those who witnessed the ball game with North Bend last Sunday over at the Bay. Berg, the U. of O. pitcher, who is working for the Mountain States Power Co., had the North Benders eating out of his hand, and the beauty of his work was that when they threatened, or Coquille bobbled, he tightened up just enough to stop anything like a rally. Peterson, of North Bend, also pitched a good game the first half, but when Coquille got a man on base he appeared to get rattled and their hits came in bunches.

Booth, in left field, made one of the prettiest plays of the game. In the fourth inning E. Frye had gotten safe hit and was on first. J. Wilson, the next man up, knocked a long fly to left. Booth made a good run and caught it and then threw straight as a shot to Abbott on first, catching Frye before he could get back to the bag.

The local team made four errors in the first two innings and things looked a little squally in the second when E. Frye was safe on Abbott's error, was advanced by J. Wilson's single and scored on Oerding's error. That was the last of their run getting.

Coquille got a hit in every inning except the first and eighth. In the fifth a single by Berg, a double by Booth, another single by Oerding and a double by Keene scored two runs. Again in the seventh a single by Oerding, an error by E. Frye, a single by Keene, a walk and a sacrifice hit by Ringle scored two more.

In the ninth the bases were loaded, three hits and an error allowing four men to get on but a double play prevented a score. Abbott, the last man up, had a chance to pile up a larger score, with three men on, but his best was a little scratch in front of the plate which Thomas threw to first.

In the seventh inning Keene pulled an unusual play by stealing home as Peterson threw to Abbott at the bat, but the latter struck at it for the third out when if he had let it go by it would have been a ball and Keene would have been safe.

Coquille is now one game behind Marshfield for second place, with only two more games to play. Should Coquille win two from Myrtle Point, one here Sunday and the other up there next Sunday and North Bend win both from Marshfield, the local team would be the runner up. It goes without saying that North Bend will win both from the Marshfield clam diggers if possible. It is reported that Lefty Schroeder will pitch for North Bend Sunday.

NOTICE TO BIDDERS

Ninth Street Improvement

Notice is hereby given that the Common Council will receive sealed proposals or bids for the improvement of Ninth Street from the east line of Heath Street to the east end of said Ninth Street in accordance with the plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer of the City of Coquille, filed in the office of the City Recorder on the 8th day of August, A. D. 1921, and pursuant to the petition of the property owners affected by such improvement and to the provisions of Ordinance No. 206 adopted by the Common Council on the 8th day of August, A. D. 1921, and the statutes of the state of Oregon therein referred to, all of which are hereby referred to and made a part of this notice.

Said improvement to be at the cost and expense of the property benefited thereby, and which property is included in the assessment described in said petition and in said ordinance and as follows: Beginning at the northwest corner of lot 2 in block 17 of the Extension of North Addition to Coquille City, in said Coos County, State of Oregon, and running thence east to the northeast corner of lot 11 in block 24 of said Extension of North Addition, and continuing thence east across a 30 foot alley or street and thence east to a point 100 feet east of the east line of said 30 foot alley or street; thence south to a point due east of the southeast corner of lot 7 in block 25 of said Extension of North Addition; thence west to the east line of said Heath Street; thence north to the place of beginning, all within the corporate limits of said City of Coquille.

Bids may be submitted for either the whole work necessary to complete the proposed improvement, or for such subdivisions thereof as will materially conflict with the completion of the remaining portion. Forms for bids and contract and bond may be had upon application to the City Recorder.

The Common Council reserves the right to reject any or all bids with or without cause.

Certified check in the sum of five per cent of the amount of bid must be submitted with bid, to be forfeited to the City of Coquille in the event that the bidder refuses to sign the contract and execute bond as provided in said ordinance, said bond to be in the sum of fifty per cent of the total amount of the contract.

The work to be completed within thirty days from the date of awarding the contract, time being of the essence thereof.

Bids must be filed on or before the hour of 5 o'clock, P. M. on the 22nd day of August, A. D. 1921; and any and all objections to said improvement or to the plans and specifications or that the same do not conform to the said petition must be filed with the City Recorder on or before that hour.
