Where the Difference Lies

Very frequently the question as to the distinction between the activities of the County Nurse and of the Home Demonstration Agent, particularly in their relations to child welfare is brought up in the minds of people in conversations or in public meetings.

There is a very distinct line between the phases of their work, the one dealing with the physical condition of the child, the other with the nutrition condition.

In regard to this questioning the following memorandum recently made by the state departments commonly interested in this work explains clearly the policies which govern the relations of the local workers in the co-operative activities:

Memorandum of Agreement between the State Bureau of Nursing and the Home Economics Department of the Extension Service of the Oregon Agricultural College

In order to strengthen both lines of work, to prevent confusion in the minds of the people, to avoid duplication, and to render the most effective service to the public, this memorandum or understanding is agreed to by the State Bureau of Nursing, of the Oregon State Board of Health, and the Home Economics Department of the Extension Service, O. A. C., as the policy which will govern the relations of County Nurses and Home Demonstration Agents in their co-operative enterprises.

The County Public Health Nurse works directly under a County Public Health Association. The general supervision of the nursing activities of the county association and the nurse is given by the State Bureau of Nursing.

The scope of the nurse's activities includes work in the schools and homes and office consultations. She does generalized public health nursing, i. e., she endeavors to handle every type of problem involved in Public Health work for which there is no other special worker in her county.

Her activities include: Prenatal work, infant welfare work, pre-school child welfare work, school inspection work, home hygiene classes, tuberculosis work, bedside care, social service.

In connection with her child welfare work, which includes the prenatal, infant, pre-school and school work, and also in connection with her tuberculosis work she endeavors to establish clinics and conferences and does follow-up work in the homes.

Home Demonstration Agents are women with Home Economics training employed by the Oregon Agricultural College and the United States Department of Agriculture who conduct co-operative Extension work in Home Economics with the women of the counties. They are supervised by the Oregon Agricultural College. Their major projects are Food and Nutrition, Clothing, and Home Improvement. Each of these major projects has many phases, any or all of which may be worked upon as the women of the community decide. The more important phases of each are:

Food and Nutrition: Food Selection, Food Preservation, Food Preparation, Adult Nutrition, Nutrition in Disease, Child Nutrition, School Lunches, Increased consumption of milk and vegetables, Nutrition classes for malnourished children, Nutrition conferences for pre-school children.

Clothing: Dress Forms; Garment Construction, Alteration of patterns, Cutting and Fitting, Finishing and Decoration; Selection of Textiles; Design; Millinery.

Home Improvement: Better equipment, Labor saving devices and methods, Furnishings and care, Home grounds, Accounts, Sanitation.

The Home Demonstration Agent shall be in charge of all nutrition work. This includes all phases of adult and child nutrition.

She shall have charge of diet cases referred to her, or being carried by her, and all nutrition classes in schools.

She shall assume full responsibility for making any change in the physician's instructions in regard to diet.

She shall refer all cases involving physical defects or disease, except diet, and all children in the nutrition classes, to the nurse for physical care. She may at the same time refer them to a physician.

She shall be prepared to make home visits where special nutrition problems are involved or to assist the nurse in the solution of all such problems.

She shall not make physical examinations, i. e., examinations for bad teeth, bad tonsils, eyes, etc., or do physical follow-up work, but she may give general information on health habits and hygiene.

The public health nurse shall have general supervision of all health work involving physical examinations and a physician's diagnosis except diet cases.

She shall supervise all physical ex-

aminations and do all physical follow-up work.

She shall refer all nutrition problems to the Home Demonstration Agent, but in isolated homes and in isolated schools she may give general advice on diets.

The Home Demonstration Agent and the County Nurse shall co-operate in planning and conduct of: Health and Nutrition Centers, Child Conferences relating to health and nutrition, Demonstrations relating to health and nutrition at Fairs and other public gatherings.

Either may work on: Home and Community Sanitation, Hygiene.

Each shall keep her own records.
