Tuition at U. of O. and O. A. C.
A tuition fee of \$60 will hereafter be charged students from states outside of Oregon, in addition to the fees now charged all students, following a joint action of committees of the boards of regents of the two state institutions.

The tuition charge of the Oregon institutions becomes effective for all new registrations from states other than Oregon, beginning next month. The \$60 will be payable in \$20 installments at the beginning of each term. Men in the service of the United States during the late war coming to the university or the agricultural college from other states will be exempted from half the regular, non-resident fee.
