"Too much celebration" appeared to be the reason why Coquille nearly lost the game here last Sunday, and "Too Much Keen" was the reason Myrtle Point really lost it. For the hucky O. A. C. player not only slammed out a double and a triple but in the ninth, with Coquille one run behind, and one man on, hit a beauty over the left fielder and before the ball could be recovered had circled the bases, almost overtaking Bill Howell who was on first when he made the hit.

It was a great finish to a game which had been thrown into the discard several times by the rawest kind of field work. Not one of Myrtle Point's six runs was earned. In the third they made a run on two errors and a fielder's choice. In the fifth a hit batsman, three errors, a hit and three fielder's choices resulted in four runs. In the eighth a walk, a hit, an error and a sacrifice resulted in one more.

"Penny" Sturdivant was going fine the first five innings and only three hits were secured of his delivery. Whether he weakened under the strain, or whether the ragging of the crowd got his goat, is uncertain, may be both, but in the last four innings his offerings were touched up for eight safe ones.

Only three of Coquille's team escaped a tally in the error column, their tendency being to see how far they could throw the ball, and how high. But the rally in the last half tickled the crowd, and everyone was happy except the ten or a dozen loyal Myrtle Pointers who were down to cheer their team.
