Have Perished by the Sword

Sound Avenue, August 15, 1921. Last Saturday was a day of high lights for the writer, and he was more profoundly moved than he has been for a long time.

It was a bright August morning, and a lovely ride of five miles among familiar scenes brought us to the old cemetery at what used to be known by the Indian name of Hochbeck.

Here it took us but a few minutes to find what we came to seek, the grave of our grandfather's grandfather, Daniel Young, a man who died when only 45 years of age.

A little later we glanced casually at a block of gray granite, whereon we read this inscription: Ephraim L. Tutthill, June 14, 1863, April 30, 1919.

These two inscriptions told the whole story. Our young cousin in the strength of his early manhood, only a little over 25, had entered the army.

Oh, the infinite tragedy and pathos of war! Shall we never cease to sacrifice our bravest and best on the altars of this Moloch? We are not ashamed of the tears we shed at this grave; nor did we feel any thrill of pride that kindred blood had been shed in the depths of the Argonne forest.

That evening we sat in the Chautauque tent at Riverhead and listened to an address by Alexander Irvine that stirred us no less profoundly than the reading of those inscriptions upon the monuments on the hill in that scrupulously neat Jamesport cemetery.

We may well despair of conveying to our readers the pictures that this word artist painted before our mind's eyes, the inspiring hope that the nations would learn war no more, with which he thrilled the hearts of his hearers.

At this table are seated a hundred men who have just graduated from the foremost universities and colleges of New England, fitted for all the higher walks of life and so educated that they need never engage in

The picture in Irvine's address was the story of his own life from the day when in the lap of infancy he sought comfort and rest in the arms of his mother, having used his leisure hours as a child in the British army to sketch designs, he also found death under the stars and stripes on the war-runged fields of France.

The first picture was of a great clock face—almost a timespiece of eternity—on which it took the minute hand 6000 years to make the circuit of the dial. Here each minute stood for a hundred years and all the ages of recorded time were completed in that encircling sweep.

Just two nations remain in the world today which have endured for more than half an hour on the face of this six thousand-year dial. Alone of them all India and China can look back over more than three thousand years of existence.

Assyria, Chaldea, Babylon, Persia, the Sarcenic empire, Greece, Rome, Spain and France have in turn towered as the foremost nations in the world. So has Great Britain, and today our own United States stands at the zenith of its power.

Reference was here made to the invitation just sent out by President Harding and Secretary Hughes to the great powers of the world to join us in a conference for the limitation of armaments and of armies, as the ray of light in all the darkness of mad expenditure for war on every hand.

Mr. Irvine's next picture was of a great loaf of bread, symbolizing all the products of all the toil of the world. All people, all conditions of men must partake of this bread to live.

And then in the farthest circle of all, came those who contributed nothing to the common welfare, who were only consumers and in no wise producers. Against even these the speaker advised no resentment, proclaimed no crusade, but would only seek in friendly ways to enlist them in occupations in which they would become a blessing to the rest of the world.

The third picture presented was one that may have been painted from life. It was a banquet hall in one of the most luxurious of New York's hotels, where the foot falls noiselessly on soft rugs and carpets that represent hundred of years of toil by the patient weavers of Persia and India and Turkey.

And then our lecturer goes on to preach a little sermon, and to admonish us all that in spite of the magnificent churches we are building and the professions we are making as followers of the meek and lowly Nazarene, we are very far from being filled with his spirit or following in his footsteps.

That there would then be no more wars; that the earth would be no longer enriched by the blood of our slain brothers; that mothers and fathers would no longer weep and mourn and die because their sons be slaughtered in fratricidal strife—millions and multiplied millions of them—would follow as day does night, if we will love our fellow men instead of hating them.

More than that, the writer is impelled to add these words of the Master which have in them a promise supernatural: "I am the resurrection and the life; he that believeth in me, though he were dead, yet shall he live; and whosoever liveth and believeth in me shall never die."

The last thoughts of Saturday night's gifted orator which come to our mind are his catalogue of the things that could be done with that 84 cents of each dollar of our national revenue now spent for past or future wars, if wholesale murder is done away with.

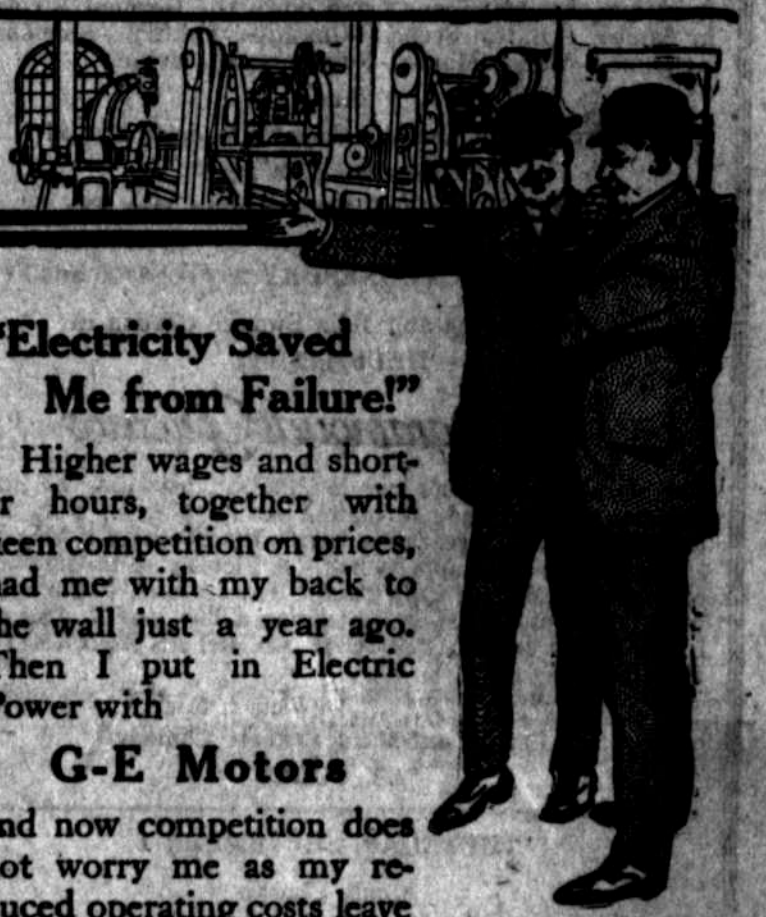
