COTTONSEED MEAL FOR BULL. Cause of More Trouble in Raising Vigorous Animal Than Any Other One Thing. Bulls should never be fed any cottonseed meal. Among all the troubles of raising and caring for bulls there is probably none other like cottonseed meal. There are many cases of temporary sterility and probably some of permanent sterility due to the use of cottonseed meal in the feed.

The following set of resolutions have been adopted by the Myrtle Point Commercial Club in an effort to urge the State Highway Commission to early action in paving the highway between this place and Coquille.

That Whereas, the State Highway Commission has seen fit to deliberately ignore their distinct promise made last year to the delegates from the various commercial bodies of Coos County and has done nothing whatever on the road between this city and Coquille despite their promise to do so last year.

And Whereas, the county has long ago, in compliance with the terms of the 1917 Road Bond Act torn up a perfectly good macadamized road and left us at the mercy of the State Highway Commission to wallow in the mud.

And Whereas, The said State Highway Commission now seeks to evade their plain duty under that act.

Therefore, Resolved, that the Myrtle Point Commercial Club hereby express its disapproval of their methods and goes on record as in favor of whatever more drastic means may be needed to compel the said Highway Commission to comply with the spirit and letter of the act without further delay.
