250 Sacks Spends to the Acre  
About two months ago the Sentinel mentioned the wonderful growth of potatoes D. C. Krantz had in his garden in the slough back of his house a couple of blocks west of this office. This week he finished digging them and reports that from a strip of ground 45x150 feet, he dug 43 sacks of spuds, averaging 106 pounds to the sack. This is a remarkable yield from less than a sixth of an acre, or 260 sacks to the acre. Nor is this the only remarkable thing about it, for the samples he left with the Sentinel measure 2x11 inches around and are an average size for the whole tract, less than three sacks of small ones being culled out. Until the vines grew too large Mr. Krantz used a hand cultivator in keeping the ground mellow and free from weeds. It's an added illustration of what the Coquille valley will produce if the proper attention is given to cultivation.

ENCOURAGE FENCE JUMPERS  
Dilapidated Fencing is Cause of Constant Trouble for Owner of Dairy Herd.  
Half broken down fences help to teach the cow to be fence jumper. Fences that are constantly jumping the fences in easy places are difficult to break in later life and nothing is more wasteful of time and patience than constantly chasing your cattle out of your neighbor's crops or your own. Good fencing is necessary equipment for the dairyman and poor fencing is a constant risk.

GIVING YOUNG CALVES MILK  
Care Should Be Taken That Temperature is Uniform—When Poor in Quality, Give Less.  
Care should be taken to see that any milk fed to the young calves is of uniform temperature of about 80 degrees Fahrenheit. Many feeders attempt to overcome poor quality in the feed by increasing the quantity. This is radically wrong. When on account of age, souring, dirt, etc., the quality of the milk is poor, the quantity should be reduced rather than increased.

Odors and Musical Notes  
It is recorded that the Ebers papyrus gives a recipe for "pills to perfume the mouth" and, according to this ancient recipe, these pills contained dry myrrh, juniper, lacmus, mastix branches and foina that had been powdered and boiled with honey. A classic experimenter, Septimus Plesse, sought to establish a theory that among odors there existed a scale or gamut, just as among sounds, sharp smells corresponding with high notes and heavy smells with low notes. He classified about fifty odors, each one, he said, corresponding to a certain note. He argued that a bouquet, to be successful, should be made up of odors corresponding with the chord of a musical scale. It was a poetic and elaborate theory, but it never made much headway in the world.—Kansas City Star.

Don't Be a Tortoise  
We have always had sympathy for the hare which lost the race to the tortoise. It was just one chance in a million that the tortoise would win out. Any smart hare in such a contest would decide that he had time for a nap; he would have had a foot here to have burned out his strength in such a competition. That he should oversleep was his misfortune. Of course it may be argued that he should have finished his race first and done his napping afterwards. That is the second guess. The point, we make it that anybody who imitates the tortoise and trusts to the hare falling asleep is going to lose most of the time. It isn't often the loser on the job, catches the other fellow asleep.
