### Corn Show at South Astoria

In an article published recently Western World, J. J. Morris tells why, from his point of view, the Coos & Curry Fair was not the success this year that it has been in the past. But his conclusion is the point in his article, which we wish to put before our Coquille readers, and although it is addressed to Bandon citizens, it applies just as logically to Coquille and the Corn Show. He says:

It is time for Bandon to talk Fair again; only suppose we do not call it a Fair; let's call it an Industrial Exhibition and make it purely educational. As a show to make money out of they do not pay—never have—only on rare occasions. But from every other standpoint of value they are hard to beat.

This should be taken up at the next meeting of the Community Club and find out if the right man or men can be found in the community to make a big success of it each year.

Coquille has made a very enviable reputation for herself for the past six years in staging a two days' Corn Show, and with the highway open this year between here and Coos Bay there will be twice the crowd there has been in the past if a Corn Show is held this year.

True, the corn is damaged, but spuds and root crops, apples and even poultry can be shown and this year's "fair" made the best yet held.

By all means we should hold our annual Corn Show this year. And some time there will be built in Coquille an auditorium suitable for housing such an exhibition.

### Fire Prevention Day

Sunday, October 9th, has been proclaimed as "Fire Prevention Day" by Governor Olson, who suggests that on or before that day every person in the state of Oregon give most serious attention to the prevention of careless fires. During the year, 1920, thirty-six people were burned to death and hundreds injured, besides a property loss of over two million dollars, as a result of fires. It is claimed that 90 per cent of all destructive fires are preventable. The Sentinel suggests to its readers that they follow Oct. 9th up with the 365 days of fire prevention. We have mentioned this to also the fortieth anniversary of the great Chicago fire.

### Arguing the Evans Case

The case of Evans against the city of North Bend and the Scandia Shipbuilding Co. was argued in Circuit Court Tuesday but Judge Coke has not yet handed down a decision. The case grew out of the death of Mrs. Evans last winter, as a result of an auto accident when the car in which she was riding was wrecked by running into a pile of the company's material in the street at North Bend. C. F. McKnight appeared for Mr. Evans, A. H. Derbyshire for the city, and Fred Hollister for the Scandia Co.

### Citizenship Papers Cancelled

The citizenship papers of Anton Yonmayer were cancelled by Judge Coke at the session of the Circuit Court here Tuesday, it now transpiring that Yonmayer was a citizen of Canada, and not of Germany, when he made application. He is a German by birth, but had been naturalized in Canada and when he swore allegiance here it was to Germany when it should have been to King George of England. He will have to start proceedings all over again.

### Working Out \$50 Fine

Bill Johnson was brought down from Powers Monday and placed in jail to serve out a \$50 fine for having intoxicating liquor in his possession. He is putting in the time working on the roads.

### Probate Court Items

Mary Blatt, of Marshfield, was appointed administratrix of the estate which consists of \$9500 worth of real and \$500 worth of personal property. Dorsey Kreitzer, Walter Butler and F. A. Haines were appointed appraisers.

John F. Hall yesterday filed a petition for the administration of the estate of John Anderson Emmett, who died last December. The estate consists of \$500 in real property.
