Will Purchase Fire Truck

All members of the common council were present for the regular session of that body last Monday evening except A. O. Walker.

As chairman of the Fire committee, E. W. Gregg reported in favor of purchasing an Oldsmobile chassis for a fire truck, the city to equip it with chemical tanks, tools, hose, etc. The price of the chassis is \$1365. No estimate was given as to what it would cost to equip the truck. The council voted to approve the report and declared their intention, for the benefit of the company's representative, Mr. Keith, who was present, to make the purchase, but it cannot be done until after Nov. 1, the beginning of the city's fiscal year. \$2500 was included in next year's budget for this purpose. Ording Bros. were issued a six-months' license to operate a bowling alley, the fee being \$25.

Peart Bros. were granted a 30-day extension for the completion of the north end planing improvement, and O. C. Harry was allowed 10 days more to finish the work on Ninth street.

It was ordered that Peart Bros. be paid the balance due them, \$1543, for the Hall and Third streets improvement, and M. W. Payne was paid the final \$200 due him on Holly and Bush street work.
