Fined \$125 for Using Boat

George Whittick was fined \$125 and costs in justice court at Marshfield Monday morning after pleading guilty to the charge of using a motor boat to shoot from in hunting ducks, says the Times. Whittick's license was revoked and his gun was confiscated, but his boat was not taken as it had been borrowed.

According to Deputy Game Warden F. A. Daniels, who filed the complaint, Whittick was hunting on South Slough in view of a number of hunters in violation of the state and federal game laws. The fine was made heavy, said Justice Joehn, because this is considered the most serious of all game violations. McDaniels is determined that hunting from motor boats must stop and will press charges against all who are found breaking the law.
