Poultry Show Next Week

Commercial Poultry Breeders Poultry Show

This exhibit is open to any one who owns poultry in Coos County regardless of whether they produce eggs in quantity for commercial use or for family use only.

Attendants will be provided to feed and water birds at least twice daily. Mash, scratch and grit will be provided. Other special feeds must be furnished by exhibitor and any special care must be given by exhibitor.

Birds will be carefully penned in dry quarters free from drafts and provided with clean straw litter.

Six females shall constitute a pen. Each exhibitor will be limited to three entries.

Prizes of \$10, \$8, \$6, \$5, \$3, \$2, \$1, respectively, will be given to the six highest laying pens.

Birds should be culled Tuesday, November 15th, and the count on eggs will commence at 6 A. M. November 16th and will end at 12 noon Saturday, November 19th.

Entries in this class are for exhibition only and cannot be entered in the score competition.

Score Competition

Entries in this class comprise laying fowls of any standard breeding. Each bird comprising an entry and each exhibitor is limited to five entries.

Each bird will be scored according to the score card as given below:

Body Type, 25; Head, 15; Conformation, 30; Handling, 10; Legs and Toes, -5; Condition of Maturity, 15.

Entries in this class must be in Coops not later than noon on Thursday, November 17th.

Ship all birds express prepaid to County Agent Parr at Coquille.

Prizes will be offered as follows: First, \$1.00; Second, 50c; Third, ribbon.

For following classes: Hens, (female birds over 1 year old).

Pullets, (female birds under 1 year old).

Cock, (male birds over 1 year old).

Cockerel, (male birds under 1 year old).

Base date for calculation of age shall be November 1st.

These prizes will be given in each of the following breed classes: Leghorns, Rocks & Wyandottes, Reds, other breeds.

Classification shall be left entirely within the judgment of the judge.

Judging will be done by comparison if the class contains more than two entries. First and Second birds will be furnished an official score card.

Birds must have been in ownership of the exhibitor for at least 30 days previous to November 15th.

Judging Contest

Open to men, women or children under the supervision of the Poultry Judge, each person will be required to place six trap nested birds in the order of their conformation for laying capacity and estimate the number of eggs they laid last year. The one who places the birds nearest correctly according to trap nest records and estimates those records most accurately will win \$5.00. Judging contest will take place at 1 P. M. Thursday, Nov. 17th.

Death of Col. R. H. Rosa

Col. R. H. Rosa, for many years Bandon's most prominent citizen, died at 9 o'clock Monday night and the funeral services were conducted there yesterday by Pacific Commandery No. 10 Knights Templar, of which he was a member. Rev. W. S. Smith, who was for several years pastor of the Presbyterian church at Bandon, preached the funeral sermon.

Col. Rosa was one of the pioneers of this section and a civil war veteran, though his military title was bestowed upon him when he commanded the Second Regiment of the Oregon National Guard. He was born in Cayuga county, New York, March 27, 1848, and passed his 73rd birthday last spring. He came to Coos county fifty years ago and soon settled in the Bandon neighborhood, where he has ever since resided. In 1876 he was elected a member of the legislature and was a member of the Port of Bandon Commission until failing health compelled him to abandon his duties.

In April, 1877, he was married to Viola Lowe, a daughter of Y. M. Lowe, who at the age of about 96 years still resides in Bandon.

Besides the wife surviving are the children, who are Florence A., the wife of A. G. Thrift, a grocer of Bandon; Lloyd L. and Archie H. Rosa, of Bandon, and Miss L. Kate Rosa, who is a teacher in Bandon. A brother resides in Los Angeles.

The following lines of appreciation are furnished by a Bandon citizen:

Personally, Col. Rosa was a most delightful personage to know. Stalwart, frank and unfeeling, he was yet kindly and generous and was a most lovable person. Those who knew Col. Rosa best and who associated with him not only respected him highly but for him held a warm admiration such as is seldom accorded men. Col. Rosa was a successful business man, a person of excellent judgment and a clever politician. Without ostentation and with the most kindly feeling for his friends, he for years maintained a dominant and powerful position in his community. Until his recent breakdown in health years did not lessen his enthusiasm or energetic activities.

To Let Four Year Contract

The postoffice department is asking for bids for carrying the mail between Bandon and Coquille once each day, seven times a week by the river route for four years, from July 1, 1922, to June 30, 1926. The schedule is to leave Bandon daily at 5:20 a. m. and reach Coquille at 8:20 a. m., stopping at Bullards, Prosper, River-ton and Leneve. The other way, leaving Coquille at 3:20 p. m., the hour to arrive at Bandon is 6:40 p. m. The bond required is \$1800 and the amount now paid is \$2449.20 per annum.

Bids will be received at the office of the second assistant postmaster general until 4:30 p. m., Jan. 17, 1922.

One Holiday a Week
