## FOR THE HIGHWAY

### County Court Resolves in Favor of the Roosevelt Highway

Yesterday the county court have adopted the following resolution in regard to the Roosevelt Highway:

In the Matter of the Roosevelt Highway, the Court of Coos County do hereby resolve and recommend that the Roosevelt Highway extension from the California line northward to the Coquille River should be a road to receive Federal aid. The court particularly desires to have the highway built with the necessity of having a road of primary importance.

1. It will be a military and commercial road.  
2. It will connect the Coquille River with the California Redwood Forest and provide the only around-road from the coast to the interior.

3. It will open up a new section of Oregon that is now without such a road.

4. That the portion through which this road is to be built is already bonded through the payment of money for the different sections of the road.

5. That of the said roadway of the greater portion already been constructed to a greater or less extent, and the line and grade, some of which is gravel, and stretches of concrete, all of said roadway in its present condition is a less degree of some of the greater portion, and in some places, a road of 125 miles, which is inaccessible and cannot be traveled.

6. That the Federal Government owns much timber on this Western coast through which this road is to be built, and which Federal land is now exempt from taxation, and which Federal owned timber is benefited and improved by the Fire Protection and Marketing Facilities provided for the benefit of the citizens of the county through heavy taxation, and the people of this county who know and love the justice and the Aid in the construction of this road.

Resolved, That hereof be sent by the court to the Secretary of the State through the office of the Chief Engineer at one copy to the Oregon Commission and the press.
