To Make Oregon Drier

District attorneys of Oregon will be called in to conference, either in Portland or Salem within the next week or ten days, to discuss law enforcement problems facing the state, according to L. H. VanWinkle, attorney general. The conference is to be called by the attorney general at the suggestion of United States Attorney General Daugherty, who has requested a conference of this nature in all states of the Union. While Daugherty in his letter to Attorney General Van Winkle lays stress on the need of attention to prohibition problems and laws involving bootlegging, the Oregon conference, it is intimated, will lay particular emphasis on the liquor question.

Attorney General Daugherty explains, in his request for the confer-

ence, the need for a better understanding between state and federal law enforcement agencies in order to avoid duplication of effort, now so common in the work of these agencies. The various states, he explains, should arrange for a strict enforcement of their laws covering the problems in hand, leaving the federal agencies to step in and take up the work which the state laws fail to cover.
