### Cases Heard in Circuit Court

Several default cases were settled in Circuit Court here Tuesday:

Ray Long was given judgment for \$244.25 and costs against W. L. Myers.

S. C. Endicott was allowed the amount of his claim, \$237.50 and costs, against C. F. Douglas as the Cedar Lumber Co.

C. G. Bleasdale was awarded the Maxwell touring car of John Day, or in case delivery could not be had of property, the amount of \$249.49 and costs.

In the case of Chas. and Sofia Silen vs. John and Hattie Richards, Laena Connelly, and the Scandinavian-American Bank, involving the possession of a lot in Marshfield, the court decided that the lot should be freed from all defendants' claims and that the bank be paid \$40 at attorneys' fees by the plaintiffs.
