

To Launch Myrtle Soon

The steam stern paddlewheel vessel Myrtle of Myrtle Point, built by Hermann Bros. of Prosper for the Myrtle Point Transportation Company, has been given its official measurement. The registered length is 60 feet, registered breadth 14.2 feet, registered depth 2.7 feet, gross tonnage 36.59, net tonnage 34.51. As application for an official number has been made and the boat will be ready for use about the first of May—Times.
