### They Oppose Hall

"The declaration that Oregon republican Catholics should support either Bean or Olcott for governor in the primaries, because these candidates had come out against such organizations as the Ku Klux Klan, was loudly applauded at the joint banquet of the Knights of Columbus and Ladies of America at the Osburn hotel Sunday evening," says the Eugene Guard of April 17.

"Charles Hall, Marshfield gubernatorial candidate, was denounced by another speaker for refusing to repudiate the published statement that he was the choice of the Ku Klux Klan and for boasting that he had been promised 20,000 Multnomah county votes, on condition that all Catholic children were compelled to attend the public schools.

"The knights denied any organized political movement to elect Catholics to office, but favored voting for those candidates who represented religious liberty and equal rights before the law. The K. K. K. came in for the strongest kind of denunciation, being hailed as an unworthy successor of the American Protective association, which flourished years ago.

"In his speech on 'American Citizenship,' Father O'Hara, who leaves soon on an extended eastern trip in the interests of the Catholic church, declared that neither the law, the army nor education could insure the perpetuity of America's democratic institutions, but only an enlightened conscience. The Biblical statement that 'the wicked fleeeth when no man pursueth,' was quoted. The speaker announced the raising by the Eugene Daughters of America within the past few weeks of a fund of \$250 for an ecclesiastical scholarship.

"Mrs. Grace Wilhelm of Harrisburg, eulogized the Daughters of America, telling of some of the commendable activities of this order. The text book provision of the Smith-Towner bill was condemned."
