

**Boldons at Crater Lake**

The Sentinel is in receipt of the following letter from A. T. Boldon, of this city, dated at Central Point last Sunday, the 16th inst.:

Editor Sentinel:—For fear our many friends at Coquille might think we had forgotten them and knowing so many at home would be interested to hear from us, I write again of our trip. On our return to Grants Pass from the Caves, which took us a week, we visited the largest placer mining plant in the United States, or perhaps in the world—a \$2,000,000 plant, modern in every way, electrified all through. This plant is at Waldo on the Crescent City and Grants Pass highway, 40 miles from Grants Pass on the Illinois river. That empties into the Rogue river at Agness, 30 miles above Gold Beach.

We celebrated the glorious 4th at Ashland, where we saw 6,000 autos and 25,000 people. I got up early on the 4th and counted the autos that were camped in the auto camp at Ashland, one of the loveliest camps between Portland and Frisco. They were fairly packed in and I counted 118 tourists camped there. Here let me say to the people of Coos county that we have on our car "Coos Bay" nicely printed or worked in large letters, and hundreds almost have asked us when the coast road by way of Coquille, Myrtle Point and Bandon would be so they could go that way and miss the awful heat of the Sacramento valley and the Rogue river section in Oregon.

Our people in Coos county cannot bestir themselves too quickly for when that highway is finished, they will see such an influx of tourists through Coquille as will make all the moonbacks of that heretofore isolated region sit up and take notice. Since we have been over here the mercury has been as high as 110 degrees in the shade and now as I write it is above 90 degrees, and it is much hotter in the Sacramento Valley, so they tell us.

Last week Tuesday we broke away for Crater Lake. We camped on our way up at Union Creek, about 25 miles from the lake, where the Natural Bridge is located. There the Rogue River, about as large as the North Fork of the Coquille at Lee, passes entirely under the rocks and emerges again below, one mighty, rushing mountain torrent in its steep descent down the mountain gorge.

From Prospect, where we camped on our way back, we drove for about twenty miles over one of the prettiest pieces of road on our entire trip. It is inside the forest reserve and built by Uncle Sam. Above Union creek a few miles is Elephant's Back, a deep gorge in solid rock, through which rushes a mighty column of water, making a grand picture. But the lake—Crater Lake—which we reached about eleven a. m., is so grand and beautiful as to baffle any attempt at portrayal by our pen. As we stood on its rim a thousand feet above its beautiful and ever-changing hues and its placid water, and as we descended the trail toward the level of the lake, a motor boat going over to Wizard Island looks no larger than a man—and yet the boat carries 40 people. As we ate our dinner beside a snowdrift 700 feet above sea level in the hotel on the brink of the lake, the thermometer registered 88 degrees. They charge \$1.25 for lunch and it is a roomy and well regulated place. When we entered the park, we paid a fee of \$2.50, which is for the entire season of 1922.

On our way back we camped at Prospect where an immense spring rushed from under the surface, the water being only 2 degrees above freezing. There is another such spring at Camp Anna and both are so cold that you think you are drinking ice water. The quantity of water that rushes out at these so-called springs is surprising. I verily believe that the one at Prospect has twice as great a flow as Cunningham creek, where it is crossed by the Marshfield highway.

We go from here to Medford, then to Ashland and from there to Klamath Falls. We have been from home now four weeks and have not heard from there in that time. Our Ford behaves fine and wife begins to think I am some driver for she willingly gives me the wheel when mountain climbing or descending either. We hope to get home in time to help elect Reuben Mast County Judge.
