The Supreme Court has denied the application for a rehearing of the Southern Pacific-Central Pacific merger case; but the law seems to give the Interstate Commerce commission authority to override the decision of the Supreme court.

The new registration in Oregon this fall indicates a widespread interest in next month's election. Marion county, of which Salem, the state capital, is the county seat, breaks the record with 20,000 voters enrolled and many other counties show large gains.

Treasury experts calculate that the new tariff law will cost the average American family \$100 a year more for clothes, food and other necessities. What they will get out of it in return the stump speakers presumably will tell them right away.—Springfield Republican.

Oct. 27 a new five cent stamp will be placed on sale, carrying a vignette of Theodore Roosevelt, that being his birthday. This denomination is the one used for most foreign letters, which makes it particularly appropriate, owing to Roosevelt's international reputation.

The Ohio statute prohibiting the teaching of German in schools below the 8th grade was under review in the United States Supreme court Monday. It is claimed that it is contrary to the 14th amendment to the constitution, which forbids the taking of life, liberty or property without due process of law. Evidently there are still people in this country who believe in "Deutschland über Alles."

Moonshine stills are responsible for not less than 25 per cent of the fires in the forests of the Pacific Northwest, according to reports. These stills are usually located in inaccessible places in the woods, where the

dry timber and brush will take fire from the smallest spark and get beyond control before the fire-fighting forces discover the smoke. Unmistakable evidence of moonshining has been found in the newly burned areas.

A total of 175 candidate are competing for the 109 state offices to be filled at the November election, according to the official list which has been prepared by Secretary of State Koser for certification to the various county clerks of the state. Of the 174 candidates 78 are labelled as republicans, 57 as democrats, 27 as republicans-democrats, 8 as independents and 4 as industrial laborites and one, T. M. Kerrigan, public service commissioner, has no political designation.

We suppose it will do but little good to repeat for the ten thousandth time the advice so constantly given to young people, as soon as they begin earning an income to lay up something for the future. It makes no difference that they can see those who have been savers in their early years with money to spend freely later in life. We have just read an illuminating story in the career of a young business man, which is worth re-telling in this connection. A Texas lumberman, who had been in business a year, had a streak of hard luck. He was building houses for people of moderate means, and giving them plenty of time to make their payments. The notes he received he sold or rediscouted at the bank at which he did business. Well, there came a panic and the bank closed its doors. The lumberman had to find another banker who would buy his notes or go out of business. He tried one bank after another, but times were tight and no one wanted to finance him. Finally, as a last resort, he struck the last, an old timer, who had the reputation of being "hard-boiled."

This man wanted a statement from the lumberman. The latter said he would go back to his office and make out one. The banker wouldn't wait for that but made an appointment with him for the next day.

The statement didn't look a bit good to the moneyed man and he was on the point of turning the applicant for credit down hard, when his eye fell upon the item, "Reserve \$3600." How a company as hard up and as new as was this lumber concern could be laying away money for a reserve at the rate of \$300 a month needed to be explained and was explained satisfactorily so that the young man got all the credit he wanted. Of course, the reserve was of no immediate benefit to him in his business as it was in a broken bank; but the will to save thus manifested stood him in good stead in that emergency. Not only that but it helped in many other ways. His reserve is now nearly \$100,000.

It Isn't Favorable

The following is from the "Come and Go" column of last Saturday's Oregonian:

"Providing the weather is favorable, we will clean up our contract on the Camas mountain section of the Roseburg-Coos Bay highway," declares William C. Stone, who arrived in Portland yesterday to submit a bid to the highway commission. "The contract is for 6.8 miles of grading and 7 miles of surfacing. We have about 30,000 yards to move in the grading and about 2 1/2 miles of base rock to put down. If the rains will hold off, the job will be completed in a month and a half, but it is nearing the season when outdoor work has to cease." In addition to the Camas mountain con-

tract Mr. Stone has been working on 8.6 miles on the Crater lake highway, near Eagle Point. This work, explains Mr. Stone, is practically wound up.

Scarlet Fever Warning

A few cases of scarlet fever, mostly mild in character have occurred in Coos county lately and of these, three are active now, and all are under quarantine and their homes are properly placarded as required by the health laws of Oregon.

Many times the illness is so slight that it is only manifested by reddened eyes and sore throat. However, if one is watchful he is quite sure to see a scarlet rash on the palate and lining of the mouth, if only for a short time. Glands on the neck usually enlarge in scarlet fever and seem to differentiate scarlet fever from ordinary sore throat. Illness develops usually within ten days after exposure to infection and the rash shows up about two days after one feels sick.

It is believed that scarlet fever is carried by the secretions of the nose and throat, mouth and ears, therefore, it is very important that handkerchiefs be placed in a disinfectant solution after use. Better still, use rags and burn them after use.

Do not assure yourself that because the symptoms were light, the illness was not serious. Even a light case frequently leaves damaged heart and kidneys to endanger the patient's future. Always call a physician and carefully follow his advice. A light case in one person may be the source of infection for a very serious case in another.

The Oregon Health Laws specify:

"For the patient and members of the family, quarantine is for not less than thirty days. Quarantine is released only after complete disappearance of inflammation of nose and throat and complete cessation of discharge from nose, throat, ears or suppurating glands. No material, dishes, bedding or clothing should be removed from the sick room without disinfection. Persons exposed who do not reside on the quarantine premises shall be kept under isolation and observation of the health officer and physician for a period of ten days."

"If the patient lives on a dairy farm or is engaged in handling of food-stuffs, the sale of milk or any other product is prohibited, unless special arrangements are made with the health officer or physician. The health officer is further empowered to destroy all food products which have been contaminated according to special regulations."

"Heads of families and children who have previously been infected may, under the permission of the health officer or physician be removed to another residence and kept in isolation for ten days before resumption of occupation or school attendance."

"After recovery or death of a patient, children in the family are not permitted to attend school or any public gathering until ten days have elapsed. The premises must be renovated, cleaned and disinfected."

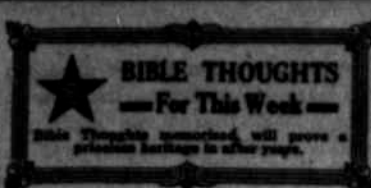
Upon the appearance of scarlet fever in schools, it is imperative that the children be examined daily by the teacher, principal, or physician or an authorized public health nurse. Those pupils found with symptoms of illness or having a sore throat must be excluded from attendance and kept under observation for ten days. If the children cannot be thoroughly inspected daily and isolation is difficult to enforce, it may become necessary to close not only the schools but all places of public assembly where children meet, for a period of one week after the onset of the disease in the last case. A strict lookout and isolation should be maintained for the appearance of "septic sore throat" infection, as many of these cases are virtually mild scarlet fever."

No Strings on It

The practice of the world war veteran's state aid commission in administering the loan feature of the so-called bonus act was upset at Salem Tuesday when the Oregon supreme court held that an ex-service man who is eligible to a loan and who obtains such loan on realty security is not required to use the money for the purchase of a farm or home. He may use the loan for any purpose that he may desire, the court ruled.

The opinion was written by Justice Rand and reverses the decision of Judge Kelly of the Marion county circuit court. Both the members of the world war veterans' state aid commission and Judge Kelly had interpreted the act to mean that the money obtained through loans was to be applied to the payment for a farm or home and could not be used for other purposes. A similar interpretation was given the act in an affirmative argument appearing in the voters' pamphlet at the time the measure was submitted to the electors at the 1921 election.

Diphtheria Menace

Public Health reports indicates that we may expect to have diphtheria present in Coos county soon, also smallpox. Diphtheria has been prevalent in some eastern states and last week was reported in California. This week ten cases of diphtheria and eight cases of smallpox have been reported for Portland.

Both of these diseases, though often fatal in their course, are entirely preventable by vaccination. Vaccination is not so unpleasant as it formerly was. Your physician can now vaccinate you for smallpox so that you will scarcely have a break in the skin. He makes only the lightest needle scratch and he uses no dressing. Do not fail to see him it once. If you feel unable to pay a physician, then come to the County Health Office in the City Hall, Coquille, on Saturday mornings when you may receive vaccination free.

Vaccination for diphtheria is given in three weekly treatments by hypodermic syringe. About two months are required after the last dose before this protection becomes effective, so no time should be lost. Children from two to fourteen years of age and mothers who care for the children should especially have treatment. Babies do not need it as a rule. Your physician is able to determine by the Shick test who need vaccination against diphtheria and who do not. However, you may take the vaccination without waiting for the Shick test findings. See your physician at once.

It is true that in the case of diphtheria we have a very efficient treatment in diphtheria anti-toxin. If you have diphtheria, call your physician early, and allow him to give you a large dose (20,000 to 40,000 units) of anti-toxin at once. Be suspicious of all sore throats, especially those of the troupy variety, for diphtheria is frequently in the nose or in the throat where the typical membrane may not be seen.

But while we have in anti-toxin a sure treatment if given early and in sufficiently large dosage, we should not depend upon treatment when we now have what is far better—prevention. If often happens that diphtheria is recognized not until late, then anti-toxin may not be obtainable or the dosage may be too small. And even when the anti-toxin is given, the heart may have already been injured. So be vaccinated—not after diphtheria is in our very midst, but now. This vaccination also may be received free at the Health Department office on Saturday morning.

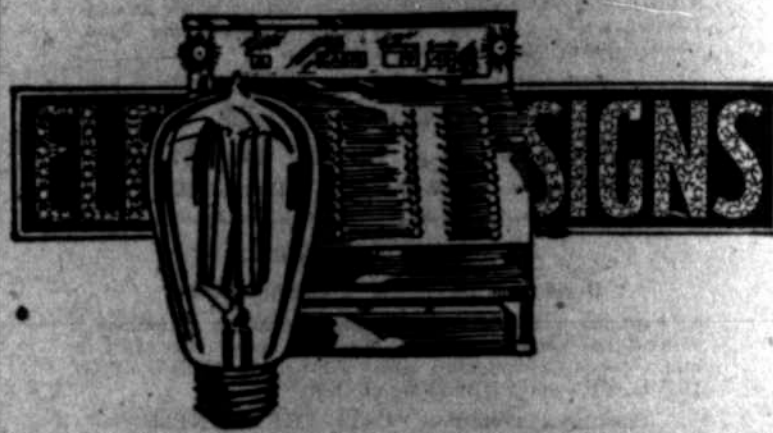
