

Ready to Sell

"The Kinney properties, consisting of 3,000 platted lots and 320 acres of unplatted property will be put on the market before the first of January," said Attorney A. S. Hammond, of the Coos Bay Union Realty company, who has returned from a two months' consultation with other attorneys of the company and equity holders of the properties.

"We have cleared everything that stands against the title to the Kinney properties and as soon as certain necessary advertising and registration can be made, we shall be ready to do business.

"Such obstructions as the John K. Kollock claim, the Howard receivership, the Watters receivership, the Shahan claims are all settled and the parties have given the Coos Bay Union Realty company deeds which will be duly registered when the proper time comes.

"We shall start the last of the legal proceedings within the next week or ten days and it takes four weeks to finish the advertising. We shall then bring suit for registering title and all who have been named here will be defendants, in addition to a number of contract holders, whose titles are not clear until the whole affair is cleaned up.

"Those people who bought of Kinney and paid out, receiving no deeds, and who afterwards bought tax titles, will be invited to join us and put over the registration of title. All they will be asked to do is to pay their proportion of the costs of the registration suit and they will afterwards receive full deeds under the new registration."

The Kinney property as platted and owned by the new company includes lots in Plats B, Boulevard C, E, some of it being waterfront.

The property has been in litigation for the past 15 years and the title was so badly muddled that nobody thought it could ever be straightened out.—Coos Bay Harbor.

Quits at Sixty-Five

Captain J. Dunson, keeper of Arago lighthouse for the past ten years, is laying down the work at the age of 65 and retires in a few days, after a service of 32 years. Captain Dunson was asked to remain five years longer, although the rules of the service require retirement with a pension of \$60 monthly at his age, and with a 30 years' service.

Body Recovered

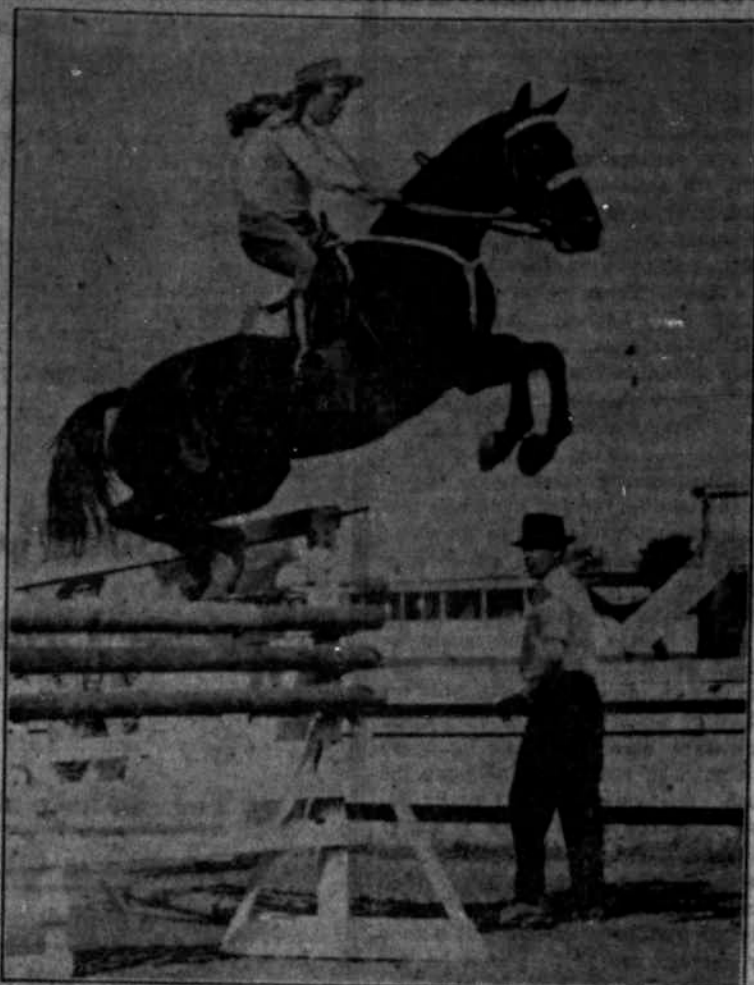
