THE TRUTH ABOUT BANDON

Mayor Topping Has Not
Proved a Phenomenal
Financier

The article quoted below praises Mr. Topping, a nominee for County Judge, for his economical conduct of the affairs of the City of Bandon.

Mr. Topping was first elected mayor in 1914, then why begin the tabulation with 1916? Because he evidently desired to mislead the people, as the following table taken from the County Records will show:

Year	Millage	Tax to be collected
1914	10	\$ 8,888.00

In addition to the increase shown above, warrants have been issued and not paid for want of funds in the sum of more than \$25,000. In the year, 1915, the people of Bandon authorized a bond issue in the sum of \$40,000, which is now unpaid, making the outstanding indebtedness of the General Fund of Bandon \$65,000, the increase in the last six years being \$25,000.

A bond issue was authorized by Bandon to erect a Hydro-Electric plant in the sum of \$110,000, which amount was expended on the project and in addition thereto warrants in the sum of \$30,000, or thereabouts, were issued on said fund and are outstanding, making a total indebtedness of \$140,000.

In addition to the above exhibition of economical ability, the Tax Rolls of the County show that the taxes levied against Mr. Topping are now five years in arrears and that on April 1st, 1922, the taxes were delinquent for seven years and previous to the tax sales two years were paid.

Further, many thousands of improvement bonds have been sold and, of course, the City has to make good the payment of these bonds in case the owner does not and it appears that many thousands of dollars of the property securing these bonds has been sold for taxes to the County and then re-sold at "junk sale," the City not protecting itself by buying the same and these bonds will have to be paid by the General Fund of the City. During all this time Mr. Topping has been mayor and City Attorney.

The following article, which is answered above, appeared in the Coos Bay Times May 17, 1922, during the Primary campaign:

"BANDON AS CITY WELL MANAGED"

"Under Mayor Topping Millage Has Been Reduced
"During period of Economy Water Works Was Purchased
And Hydro - Electric Plant Built

"Some interesting figures as to the cost of operation of the city of Bandon are seen in a review of the tax figures for some years past. Bandon is now the third lowest city in the county as to the city taxes and for six years the millage for the city has been greatly decreased, which reflects very creditably upon George P. Topping, who has been mayor. When Mr. Topping took office the millage for Bandon was 18 now it is 12.5. The following are the figures: 1916, 18; 1917, 13.3; 1918, 11; 1919, 13.1; 1920, 14.7; 1921, 12.5.

"This shows a great decrease during the administration of Mr. Topping, and during this period the city bought the water works and also built the Hydro-Electric plant. Mayor Topping put the water works on a paying basis, so it did not cost the people anything and then undertook and successfully carried out the establishment of the Hydro-Electric plant and in spite of these two big municipal undertakings the millage for the city has been decreased. These facts are taken to indicate that Mayor Topping has shown good business judgment and management as a public official while mayor of Bandon."
