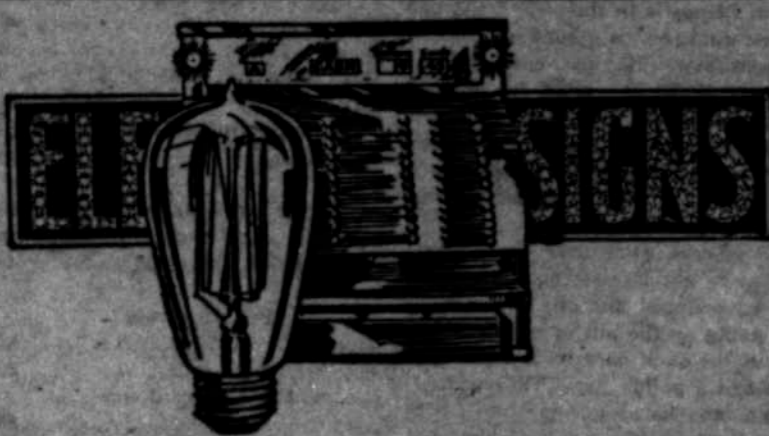

Daily News to be Sold

William L. Carver, receiver of the Southwestern Oregon Daily News since August 21, Monday made his first report to the court, Judge John S. Coke, at Coquille, and asked the court for permission to dispose of the property at public sale at the expiration of ten days' notice to the creditors.

This permission was granted with the instruction that the creditors be notified as provided in the request.

The report of the receiver stated that the indebtedness of the Southwestern Oregon Daily News was likely to reach nearly up to \$18,000.

Mr. Carver said that on account of the uncertainty of continuing under a receiver he wanted permission to sell the paper as a going concern, believing it would bring more money than if it should be closed.

It was seen by the report that the receiver was finding it difficult to continue the newspaper as a going concern because of the difficulty of disposing of receiver's certificates. He therefore asked Judge Coke to set the earliest possible moment for the sale, which was allowed to be 10 days by the court.

Mr. Carver, therefore, is sending out today notice to creditors, as required in the court order, setting the date for sale at the News office at five o'clock on November 10, 1922.—Daily News.

In the same issue of the News it is stated that the Coos County Publishing company, which has been incorporated to buy the S. W. Oregon Daily News and its good will, has just paid the remainder of the purchase price of the Bennett Trust Co.'s first mortgage on the News plant. The balance of the \$8250 claim of the Bennett Trust Co., which was paid Tuesday morning was \$4250, the new company having paid \$1,000 on the newspaper plant about the time it was organized early in October.
