### Clean Milk

Milk is the most valuable food that we have. It is especially so to those who need it most—the children. It is the most easily assimilated food in common use and the most complete food, for it contains all that is needed for body growth and sustenance. No other foods can take its place for the growing child. Recent experiments made in New York show that each child needs one quart of milk a day in order that it may have sufficient calcium for proper bone growth, and no substitute for milk, such as vegetables, contains the necessary calcium in so easily assimilable a form.

And milk is quite as satisfactory a food for germs as it is for children. Also it is most easily contaminated by means of dirty can, bucket or bottle. But germs are not good for children nor even for adults, so if milk is to be a suitable food for them to use, then it must be kept as nearly free from germs as possible. In other words, milk must be so handled that everything it touches in passing from cow to child must be as clean as it is possible to be made.

That such cleanliness is not everywhere a fact is evident from reports of dirt seen in milk bottles as a sediment before the milk is used. When the sediment is so great that it may be seen, then there must be a very serious and criminal carelessness. When a man will serve such milk to his own family, let alone to customers, he deserves to be dealt with severely. This matter is now under investigation by the county board of health. Dealers must measure up to the requirements necessary to produce clean, healthful milk.

It is necessary that the herd be tested for tuberculosis, that the stable have tight floor, walls and ceiling, that the stanchions be creosoted once a year, the walls be whitewashed often enough to keep them clean and the floor be thoroughly cleaned daily. There should be ample light and ventilation and clean fresh water is as necessary for cows as for people.

The yard must be well drained, and all manure should be removed daily in order to prevent fly breeding and to prevent contaminating odors which milk absorbs readily. Or if for any reason manure may not be removed daily, then it should be stored in a metal lined box which has a tight fitting cover. Be sure that drainage of the yard is away from, not towards, the well. (Open wells with a bucket and rope are always contaminated. Get a pump, line the well with cement and put a cement slab on top.)

The udders of the cow should be washed with warm, clean water before milking, the milkers should be clean and should use small mouth pails. After milking, remove the milk directly to the milk room before pouring it from the bucket; strain the milk through a clean cloth strainer and into the cooler so as to cool it at once to 50 degrees Fahrenheit. From the cooler the milk may be drawn into clean and sterilized bottles and then it should be kept at a temperature of 50 degrees Fahrenheit until it is delivered.

A milk room is best placed well away from the house, stable and all outhouses. If it is in the stable building a tight wall to the ceiling should separate it from the stable. Doors and windows should be tightly screened against flies; floors, walls and ceiling should be tight. Walls and ceiling should be whitewashed or painted and the floor should be laid so as to be easy to wash and drain. The whole room together with its utensils must be kept scrupulously clean at all times and free from unnecessary objects.

Adjacent to the milk room may be located the wash room for bottles and utensils. This room will also be screened and kept clean like the milk room and should be equipped with an abundant supply of hot and cold running water, and with steam for sterilizing bottles and utensils. Note that clean bottles will be received from customers and these bottles will always be thoroughly cleansed and sterilized by the milk man before re-filling.

In case of contagious disease in a customer's family, special precautions will be observed by the milkman to keep the bottles used by that family apart from his other utensils. In case of contagious disease in the milkman's family, special arrangements must be made with the health officer in order to continue the sale of milk.

As the milkman may not receive dirty bottles from his customers, so customers may not return uncleaned bottles to their milkman. Old sour milk breeds germs which must not be taken back to the dairy to contaminate other milk. Rinse all bottles first with cold water then with hot water immediately after emptying them.

### BENNETT FOR REPRESENTATIVE

Representative T. T. Bennett were the principal advocates against the Fair Bill and goes on to say: "Tom Bennett took the position that if Portland wanted to hold a party, it should not ask others to pay for it. Tom Bennett has been the most determined opponent of the Exposition in the Lower House." The next session of the Legislature will undoubtedly be asked to go the limit in committing the State of Oregon to the 1925 (now 1927) Portland Exposition. It will undoubtedly be one of the big issues in the next session of the Legislature and T. T. Bennett

can be relied upon to most vigorously oppose the efforts of Portland politicians to place a large tax upon Coos county for a Fair to be held two hundred and fifty miles away. Mr. Bennett has had legislative experience and gave Coos county a vigorous and efficient representation. He stood exceptionally well with his colleagues and stood well with men most closely in touch with the Legislature.

The Oregon Voter under date of March 25, 1922, says of him:
