Finds Road Good

The following is from the Eugene Register:
"The road to Coquille from Roseburg is fine for motor traffic, according to C. H. Day, of the Coquille Coal company, who has returned after a motor drive to the mines of the concern. The total of 170 miles of the trip from Eugene was covered in less than seven hours, states Mr.

Day. Much activity is going on in the mines of the Coquille company and within sixty days the plant will be taking out a capacity supply of coal, he reports."

Pictures of Highway

Tuesday's Oregonian has the following about the Roosevelt highway pictures that are being placed in the leading Portland hotels:

"A large ornamental frame containing half a dozen beautiful hand-colored photographs of the Roosevelt coast highway in Coos and Curry counties will be installed in the leading Portland hotels. C. W. Parker of Coos Bay is in town with one of these frames, which has been set up in the lobby of the Benson. The photographs give a splendid idea of the magnificent scenic points on the highway in the southern coast counties, where the road has been carved out along the cliffs overlooking the Pacific ocean. The county courts and the good roads association of Coos and Curry are financing three pictures and they plan also to have large signs erected. One sign will be at Crescent City, Cal., another will be at Grants Pass and another at Roseburg. Between the large signs, every few miles, will be smaller signs telling tourists how to get to the Roosevelt coast highway and the Coos Bay highway.
