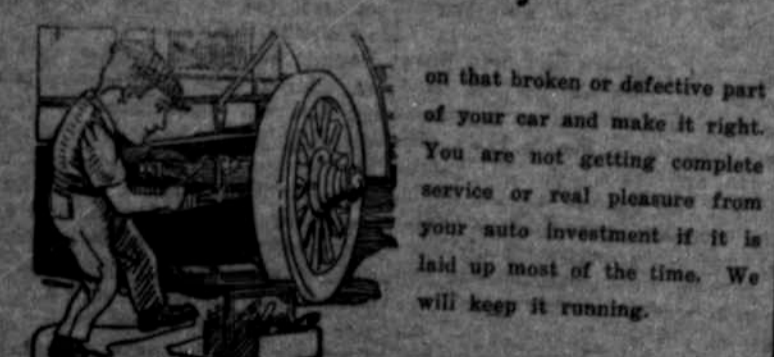

Health Notes

Reports from the State Board of Health laboratory on specimens of water from faucets in North Bend and Marshfield show the city water of both places to be safe.

Portland developed twelve new cases of diphtheria last week. Otherwise there is a general improvement in the state as to contagious disease.

New pamphlets have been received by the department of health on the following subjects: Health Alphabet, Scarlet Fever, Diphtheria, Whooping Cough, Tonsils and Adenoids, Typhoid Fever and How to Prevent It, Care of the Teeth, Eyesight and Health. A postcard will bring these pamphlets to any address.

One of the largest Life Insurance Companies in the United States reports a marked decrease in the death rate among its insured persons. It has disseminated a quantity of free information such as is contained in these pamphlets and the company believes that this is the reason for the fewer deaths. People are learning to prevent illness.

By keeping children warm and dry, colds can be prevented. The employees of an eastern board of health are required to wear a gauze mask on their faces and cotton gloves on their hands when they have colds. This has been ordered in an effort to stamp out the continual round of office colds. One hour in a poorly ventilated hall, church, office or school room is sufficient to start a cold, if in contact with others who have colds. A cold may be insignificant; or it may prove to be the starting point for a variety of more serious and intractable complications such as sinus and ear infections, laryngitis and bronchitis which are more easily prevented than cured.

Got a Sheep-Killing Bear.

The Russell brothers at Seven Mile killed a big black bear last week, according to residents of that community in town Friday. The bear had killed several sheep and goats for residents along the creek before
