## Better Invest Again

"It is hoped that every person who can do so will exchange War Savings Stamps, soon to fall due, for Treasury savings certificates," said Postmaster J. W. Lennie. "The large amount of money invested and the great number of persons who purchased war savings stamps showed that the people of this country could save money when the necessity arose. Now, if they will take the money they saved when they bought stamps to aid the government in the prosecution of the war and buy Treasury savings certificates, they will demonstrate that the thrift lessons of the war have not been without effect. The holders of war savings stamps have seen investments of about \$20.50 grow to \$28 in five years, and larger amounts in the same proportion. They can see the same thing repeated if they invest in Treasury savings certificates. Interest accumulates at the rate of 4 per cent each year, compounded semi-annually. These savings certificates are exempt from the normal Federal income tax, and from all State and local taxation (except estate and inheritance taxes), and may be held to the amount of \$5,000, maturity value, for each issue, by every member of a family. They are backed by the credit of the United States Government, and afford an easy and sure method of saving."

## An Obituary

Joseph Henry Magill was born in Henry county, Illinois, Jan. 26, 1847. He moved to Iowa in 1864 and was married to Miss Susie Martini in 1870. They moved to Mississippi in 1879 and came to Douglas county, Oregon, in 1885, and to Coos county in 1888, where he has resided until about a year ago when he went to Hoodport, Oregon, where he died Nov. 29, 1922. He leaves to mourn his loss his widow and five children, as follows: A. M. Magill, Myrtle Point; E. M. Magill, Powers; N. G. Magill, Hoodport; E. R. Magill, Dothan; and Mrs. N. A. Hollenback, Springfield, Ore., and one sister, Mary Mary Wilson, and six grand children.
