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Jury Could Not Decide

A suit instituted in Justice Stanley's court, in which Dr. C. R. Bloyd was attempting to collect \$63 for chiropractic treatments given Miss Beas Finley in April and May, 1919, was tried last Saturday. G. Russell Morgan appeared for the plaintiff and C. R. Barrow for the defendant. After waiting nearly an hour the attorneys agreed to try the case with only five jurors, it appearing impossible to secure the full number of six. Those secured were M. O. Hawkins, A. N. Gould, E. A. Wilmer, C. D. Hudson and H. A. Young.

Dr. J. P. Bray, chiropractor of Myrtle Point, was called to testify to the reasonableness of the \$1.75 per treatment asked and he and Dr. Bloyd were the two witnesses for the plaintiff.

Dr. Jas. Richmond, Mrs. Minnie Stone, E. B. Finley and the defendant were the witnesses for the defense.

The testimony and evidence submitted by the principals was so contradictory and being unsupported by corroborative testimony, the jury was unable to reach a decision in the case and after an hour's discussion reported themselves as unable to agree.

The report published in the Daily News that the jury stood three for the plaintiff and two for the defendant is incorrect. True, one ballot resulted that way, but the jurors all expressed themselves as being unable to decide whether the testimony of the defense, that the treatments were to be administered free of charge, or that of the plaintiff that nothing was said as to free treatments, should be given the greater credence, and they could all have quickly agreed had the preponderance of evidence been in either direction.

Another point on which the defense laid much stress was that no statement of an account due was made to the defendant until December, 1922, when she received notice from Berg & Morgan.

Miss Finley, who was sixteen and one-half years of age when she took the treatments, is now a school teacher and her salary as such has been attached.

The case will probably be tried again.
