Paying in Curry County

The Curry county court, at its special April session held the beginning of the month, ordered warrants drawn for sums aggregating \$2521.20 in payment for right of way over privately owned property for the Roosevelt highway.

The county court will co-operate with the forest service people in constructing a bridge across Mule creek in the Big Bend district, one of the least improved sections of the county. The structure is to cost \$800.

The court will also call for bids for construction of a new ferry scow to be used at Bagnell's ferry at

Rogue river near Gold Beach.
