

Getting Ready for Them

The Coos Bay Times says: Since the Roseburg highway has been opened Coquille has felt the benefit of the tourist travel but this is believed to be but little compared to what will come next year when it will be possible for tourists to get through the coast highway and connect at Coquille with the highways to Coos Bay and to Roseburg. Coquille expects to get the benefit of all the through travel. The people of the county seat are alive to the conditions and are preparing to meet the demands of a new era of business. A fine hotel has been erected, homes are being built and many more will be erected to take care of an increasing population. The business section of the city is being built up and the stores are improving.

Burned to Death

We are learning all the while how many different risks the people take who go on to the highways with cars. The following tragic story from Astoria recalls the somewhat similar one we recently published from The Dalles:

Mrs. George B. Demers was perhaps fatally burned as the result of an automobile accident on the Columbia highway near Globe yesterday. The machine ran off the road, plunging down the embankment and pinning her beneath it. She lay there for 12 hours unable to move while acid from the battery dripped steadily on her face and shoulders, searing her flesh in a frightful manner.

To Have Everlasting Piles

Mayor Keizer, of North Bend, states that the city engineer has plans perfected and arrangements made for the construction of the city dock, and that work is to be commenced within a short time.

One of the deterring features has been regarding a machine to encase the pilings in cement, which is to protect them against termites. This machine has been purchased at a cost of about \$1500. It is operated by compressed air, and this portion of the rig is to be supplied by Kruse & Banks. The machine compresses the cement into the piling firmly and quickly. Engineer Cavanaugh says that pilings so treated and properly set should last indefinitely.

First Vessel From England

The English steamer St. Dunstan, direct from Liverpool, docked Tuesday morning at the Coos Bay Lumber company mill to load lumber. She is said to be the first vessel to come direct to Coos Bay from England. Capt. Wallace McKenzie is in command of the ship.

She sailed from Liverpool on November 5 and arrived off Coos Bay about two days ago but did not venture in until early Tuesday morning. A partial cargo is to be taken on here which will be completed in the Columbia river and Gays Harbor. Coos Bay Times.

To Adopt Drastic Ordinances

Members of the City Council are discussing the details of at least two ordinances which will be passed at an early date that will have to do with the majority of the general public. One is to prohibit automobiles from gatherings about the streets in the vicinity of a fire, hindering the firemen at their work. Raising Too Much Fruit

Visiting in Bandon, Charles Pape said that at Gilroy, California, the fruit growers received \$15 a ton for pears and \$15 and \$20 a ton for apricots.

Says the Coos Bay Harbor: "At Coquille, the city treasurer's report shows that there was but \$173 taken in for fines in the past year, and where moonshining and traffic violations are so common the receipts might easily have been quadrupled. But, perhaps, over there they 'Have a heart,' and look upon the man who lets his foot slip as a candidate for reasonable correction and not a subject for high jackers."
