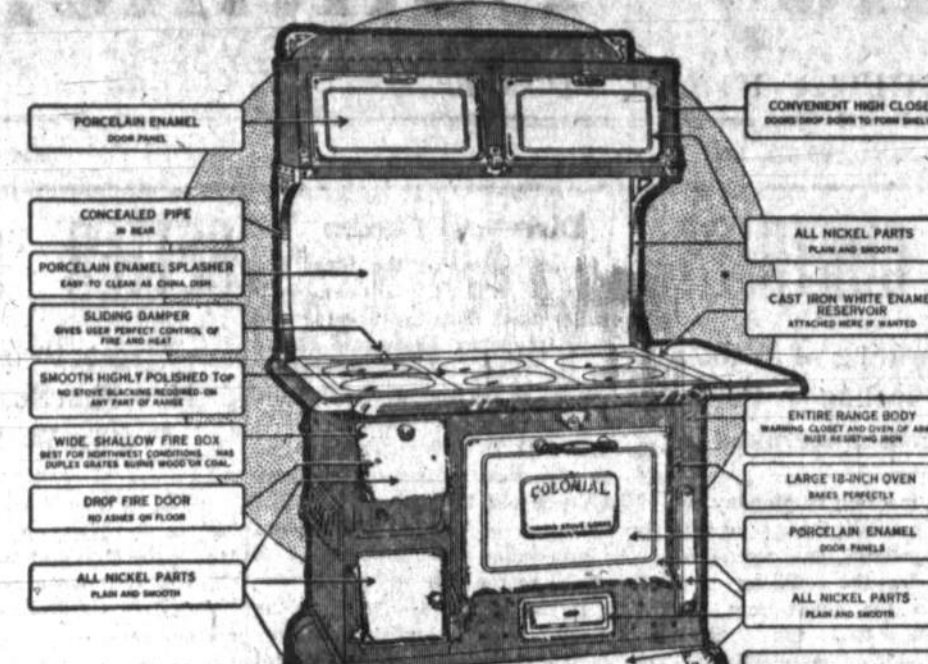

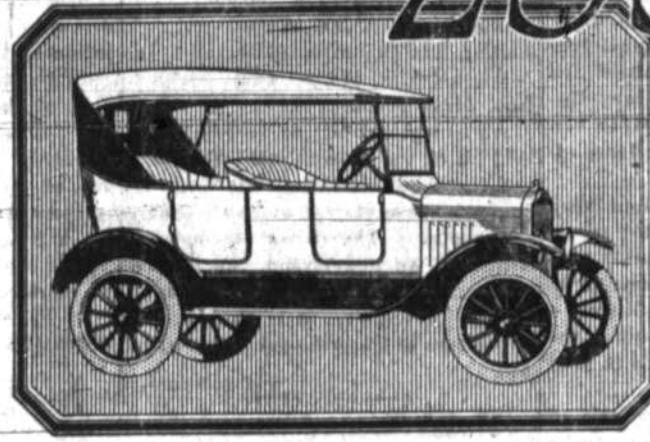

### Nine-Tenths Tied Up

There will be plenty of road work in 1924, and much mileage added to the road map showing improvement, but this will be work heretofore tentatively agreed on. For instance, as Roy Klein, highway engineer and secretary to the commission, explained to the commissioners yesterday, there will be some \$2,700,000 available for work this year, but all except approximately \$300,000 is tied up with promises, so there remains but the \$300,000 for brand new enterprises. And against this \$300,000 a dozen counties

are making requests which, if granted, would require a few million dollars to satisfy.

The road debt limitation of 4 per cent set by the constitution represents \$41,600,000 on present assessed valuations. No obligations can be incurred beyond that figure. There are three bodies authorized to sell bonds for roads—the state highway commission, the board of control and the governor. Each can act independently of the other and any one of the three can bring the obligations up to the constitutional limit.—Oregonian.

### Option on Chandler Hotel

It was reported Wednesday that Harold Glassow, formerly of the Osborn hotel at Eugene, will be associated with H. J. McKeown in the ownership of the Chandler hotel on which an option was given Tuesday for \$100,000. It will be a stock company arrangement. Claude Nasburg is understood to be handling the negotiations.—Times.

### Measles Can Be Prevented

Why should your children have measles? Measles is a preventable disease. Notwithstanding this fact, measles is prevalent in Coos county and new cases are occurring daily. It is well, therefore, for all teachers to be on the lookout for cases of measles in their schools. The disease is more common among school children, but it may also occur among adults.

Measles is an acute, febrile disease, characterized chiefly by skin eruptions in the form of rash, and inflammation of the mucous membrane, accompanied by a watery discharge from the nose, eyes, and throat. In the beginning it is hard to differentiate from a common cold in the head, but the diagnosis is generally settled upon the appearance of the rash. Measles is probably the most contagious of all diseases, and spreads throughout a community like wildfire. The disease is transmitted generally through droplets and the sprays from the nose and throats of persons having the disease. It also is probably conveyed to some extent through the use of handkerchiefs and towels. It is not believed that the scales from measles have much to do with the spread of the disease. Measles is one of the most difficult conditions to control. This is due not only to the contagious character of the disease but also to the fact that it is contagious before the rash appears. Ignorant and indifferent mothers also play a part in its spread. Mothers should keep their children away from picture shows and all public gatherings until the epidemic has been abated, and children with symp-

toms of colds should be kept away from school until it is definitely determined that they do not have measles.

### Automobile Statistics

Among the many interesting facts and figures of the automobile industry just given out by Alfred Reeves, general manager of the National Automobile Chamber of Commerce, are:

During the year 3,644,000 passenger cars were built of a total wholesale value of \$2,243,385,000. The average retail price was \$811. Of the total passenger cars built 1,235,000 or 35 per cent were of the closed type.

Motor vehicles registered in the United States number approximately 14,500,000, of which 12,880,000 are passenger cars.

The number of persons employed in motor vehicle and allied trades is 2,750,000.

In the United States there are 43,607 dealers in automobiles and trucks, 50,911 public garages, 67,802 service stations and repair shops, and 65,988 supply stores.

### T. C. Russell Promoted

Word was received at Marshfield that T. C. Russell, formerly general superintendent of the Beaver Hill mine, but for several years superintendent of the big mines at Diamondville, Wyoming, has been promoted to general manager of the company operating them. The promotion will result in his removal to Butte, Mont., where general headquarters. Mr. Russell still owns considerable property in Marshfield, including a business house at Second and Central.
