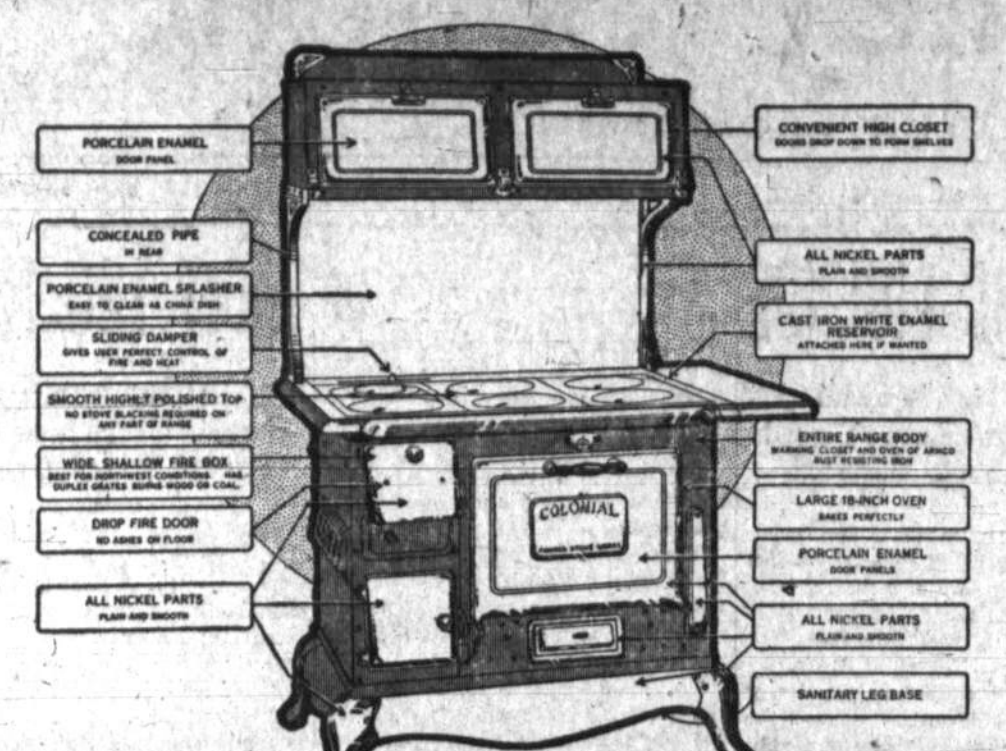


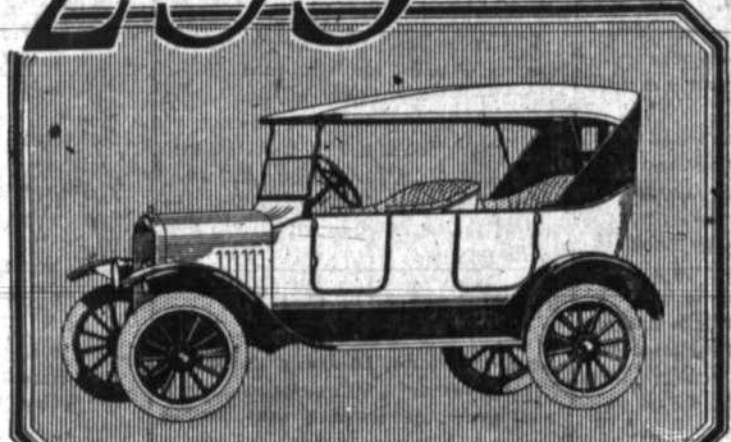

Chandler Sale Held Up

Confirmation of the Chandler hotel sale to H. J. McKeown for \$100,000 will be delayed until February 27, says Ben R. Chandler. Unless waivers are received from every stockholder, the law requires that a notice of the meeting be published once each week for 30 days. It will be necessary to go through this procedure to make the sale legal, according to Mr. Chandler.

Sale of the hotel is certain to be confirmed on that date for both parties are fully agreed on the terms published January 15. More than the necessary two-thirds of the Coos Bay Hotel company stockholders have agreed to the terms so there is no chance of blocking the sale from that angle. Terms call for an initial payment of \$35,000 and the balance within a period of 10 years.—News.

Passing of Mrs. S. C. Morris

Dora Wyatt was born in Grundy county, Mo., March 8th, 1863. She grew to womanhood on the farm on which he was born. She obeyed the Gospel and became a Christian at the tender age of 13 years and was ever faithful and devoted in the service of the Lord. She loved the Lord and loved his people with a deep abiding love.

She inherited the study qualities of her Scotch ancestry and was as direct in thought, speech and action as a sunbeam. She never attempted to accomplish her purposes by indirection, hence her life was an open book and easily understood. Her speech was as pure as the heart from which it flowed, no insinuating phrases, no by-words, but a flow of pure sparkling words laden with love and good will. C. A. Smith On Mud Flat

The last remaining vestige of the C. A. Smith is now lying high on a mud flat at Tar Heel. The bow of

the wreck which for the past few days has been lying where it anchored itself near the fairway at the harbor mouth was cut loose from its anchor chain this morning at about 10 o'clock and towed inside and beached where it would no longer menace navigation.

The U. S. coast guard cutter Tamora and a power boat from the local coast guard station did the work of cutting loose the wreck. The power boat went up alongside the wreck and coast guards cut the anchor chain with a hacksaw. The cutter then got a line on the hulk and towed it to its final resting place.—Times.
